Two children of Mr. and Mrs. William Wiltzie of Mayfield Avenue are reported on the sick list.

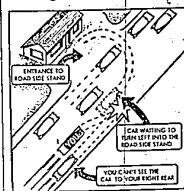
Mrs. V. C. Reddy of Shady-side Avenue was recently calling on Mrs. Ira J. Magner in Detroit.

No. 3: Slow Down For Left
Turning Vehicle.

Speed can get you into trouble when a car ahead slows down and stops before turning into a road-side stand on the highway not at an intersection. If you were in the lane nearest the center line because you had been passing other cars it would be right in front of you.

You will be tempted to turn right and pass this vehicle on the right. But there may be an unseen car at your right rear where your turn will cut in front of it. When you see a car ahead slow down immediately and have time to see what is coming behind you. You had better practically stop before taking the risk of moving over into the right-hand lane.

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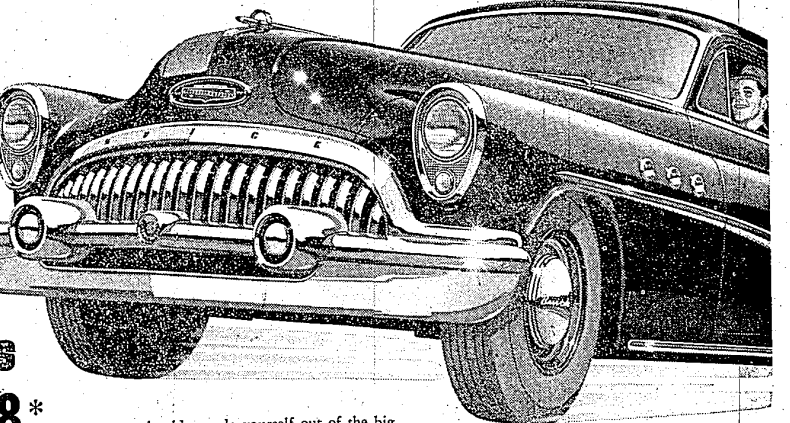
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
