University of Michigan fraternity pledges are gathering step leaders and paint palettes. They will join the sorority pledges in journeying out to the University's Fresh Air Camp for Underprivileged Boys in the first project of their community services program.

For five days, from November 2 to 7, the camp will be a beehive of activity as the pledges clean up the grounds and paint the cabins to do their part in helping underprivileged children.

Another highlight in the fall schedule for the pledges will be a November 12 banquet honoring the 500 new pledges. A trophy honoring high scholarship will be awarded to last year's pledge class with the highest average.

Since 1845 fraternities have been on the U-M campus. Today they number 43 houses with 2,000 active members.

The large capacity bus is expected to be in frequent use by the school system athletic teams for over-the-road transportation to sporting events as well as regular student transportation.

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Annual MMPA Meet Set For Nov. 5

The thirty-seventh annual meeting of the Michigan Milk Producers Association to be held in Fairchild Theatre at Michigan State College, East Lansing, on Thursday, November 5, will bring together some 400 delegates representing more than 16,000 members of the organization. The delegates come from 23 counties and are elected to serve by the dairy farmers belonging to 105 local units of the state association.

The meeting is an all-day affair with reports to be made by Association officials covering the finances, past year's operation and presentation of resolutions to shape policies for the coming year. One of the foremost matters for discussion will be the increased advertising program of the American Dairy Association with Lester Will, manager, presenting the proposed nation-wide merchandising plan.

Dr. Clifford M. Hardin, dean of agriculture at Michigan State College, will deliver the address of welcome after which the morning session, which commences at ten o'clock, will be devoted to matters of business. Following lunch at the People's Church, young farmers who are active in 4-H Club, Future Farmers of America and Young Cooperators work will be presented and tell of the program they are carrying out.

C. A. Iverson, who heads the Dairy Industry Department of Iowa State College, will be the guest speaker and will talk on the subject, "People are as important as cows in the dairy industry".
