Trojans Surprise Inkster-Roosevelt In 7-0 Upset Victory On Friday

Last Friday, October 30, the Clarencville Trojans surprised the Inkster-Roosevelt team with a 7-0 victory. The Trojans were the first of the season for Inkster-Roosevelt, who is in first place in the Metro-Suburban League.

The victory is another tribute to the Trojan defense, which has held its last three opponents scoreless.

The game started as Ed Gilmore kicked off to Roosevelt. The kick went into the end zone and Roosevelt took over in the 20 yard line. After a series of plays Roosevelt was forced to punt. The kick rolled down to the Clarencville 30 yard line. The first Trojan play was halted after a two-yard gain, but on the second play, Clay Robbins, Trojan right half back, ran 65 yards for a touchdown on a cross buck. Ed Gilmore's placement was good and the Trojans led 7-0.

After the score the Trojans dug in and tried to protect their skinny lead. The Roosevelt eleven fought bitterly to get a score but the Trojan defense held tight and Roosevelt only moved inside the Trojan 50 yard line once during the remainder of the half, but that drive fizzled on the 43 yard line.

In the second half the Trojans again kicked off to Roosevelt. The Trojans held tight and forced Roosevelt to punt. After a few exchanges of punts with Clarencville having the ball on their own 39 yard line with fourth down and 3 yards to go, the Trojans went back into punt formation. A bad pass from center kept him from getting his kick away, but Grose, a one-time halfback who now plays tackle, darted up the sideline to the Roosevelt 21 yard line for the first down to end the quarter.

In the final period with first down and ten to go on the Roosevelt 31, Roosevelt intercepted a Trojan pass and ran it back to the 24. The Trojan defense again held and an exchange of punts again took place. With two minutes remaining in the game, the Trojans' Dick Grose punted from the midfield stripe and the ball rolled down to the two yard line.

On the first play the Roosevelt fullback carried the ball around end to the 15 yard line but a Roosevelt punting penalty took the ball back to the one yard line. On the next play Jim Galloway, Trojan left guard, tickled the Roosevelt fullback in the end zone but the Trojans were offside and the entry was nullified. A few plays later the game ended with the score Clarencville 7, Roosevelt 0.

The Trojans dedicated this game to center Dick Wood, who is lost for the rest of the season due to a shoulder injury which occurred in the Holly game on Friday, October 3.

Young - Giuliani To Fight Nov. 6

Hoping for another crack at Bobo Olson and the middleweight championship, Paddy Young returns to the ring wars in a ten round bout against Sammy Giuliani to be nationally telecast and broadcast Friday night, November 6, on the Cavalcade of Sports.

The bout, on NBC's TV network and ABC's radio network, will start at 10:00 p.m. New York Time.

This will be Young's first fight since he dropped a 15 round decision to Olson last spring when the two fought it out for the right to meet Randy Turpin. Olson took the world's crown when he met Turpin recently.

Tanked fifth in the middleweight class, Young has met all the good ones and beaten most of them. His record shows 55 fights, with 41 wins, seven losses and three draws. He has scored 21 knockouts.

In Giuliani, Young is meeting a fighter who has copied decisions in four of his last five fights. A busy, two fisted body puncher, Giuliani has had 37 fights, winning 28, losing eight, with one draw. He has scored eight knockouts.

Harry Berman, Berkley fullback, carried the first play from the scrimmage line through his own left tackle where he was hit and fumbled the ball. Robinson scooped up the loose ball and dodged and ran 52 yards for the score. John Fawcett kicked the extra point and Farmington led 7-0 with only 30 seconds of football played.

Game Of The Week Schedule Revised

The TV Football Game of the Week program for Saturday, November 7, over the NBC-TV network will be regionalized with separate and complete game telecasts being presented in each of three sections of the nation.

A fourth game will be telecast locally. The three regionalized one-game telecasts will replace the four-game panoramic presentation originally scheduled for November 7. The NCAA has approved the change in the program.

Here is how the NBC-TV network will be divided for the November 7 presentation:

1. The Florida - Georgia game starting at 2:15 p.m. (E.S.T.) in Jacksonville, Florida, will be seen over NBC stations in Washington, D. C., Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Arkansas.

2. The Kansas - Kansas State game starting at 1:45 p.m. (C.S.T.) in Lawrence, Kansas, will be seen over NBC-TV stations in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas.

3. The Wisconsin - Northwestern game starting at 2:15 p.m. (E.S.T.) in Evanston, Illinois, will be seen over all other stations on the NBC-TV network, including the Pacific coast.

The North Carolina - South Carolina game starting at 1:45 p.m. (E.S.T.) will be televised only by the station in Columbia, S. C., the game site, due to limited cable facilities preventing wider coverage.

The four games involved in the revised schedule are the same four games which were included in the originally scheduled panoramic telecast.

Ranging in age from Smith, Kuenn and Umphlett, all of whom

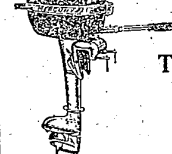
