The meeting was called to order by chairman Frazer Wadsworth. The reports of the secretary and treasurer were read and approved. A discussion was then held on attendance — what can be done to bring out all Farm Bureau members and what to do about Blue Cross members in regards to attendance.

Women's delegate Mrs. Grace Rexin gave a report on the county meeting. Minute Man Wendell Green gave his report and made a motion that the secretary be instructed to write the president, also our senators and representatives and letters to our legislator. Secretary of Agriculture Benson in his reorganization of his department, encouraging the feeling that individual farmers have more voice in the agriculture program. Motion was carried.

At Northwest YWCA

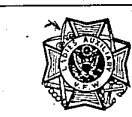
