Farmington Court Stresses Safety

Judge John J. Schutte this week announced that his court is cooperating with the State Safety Commission on the October-November Safety campaign to reduce pedestrian accidents. Motorists are expected to take into account the special hazards of the season—more hours of darkness, rain, snow, sleet, and more pedestrians shopping.

The death of over 400 pedestrians a year in Michigan is reasonable proof that many motorists have failed to drive as safely as the law and their driver's license requires.

"While there is no separate law in Michigan requiring motorists to slow down when approaching pedestrians, as there is in some states, the violation of the Michigan basic speed law, running red lights and stop signs, improper turns and dangerous passing frequently endanger the pedestrian," the Judge said.

"This court will make a special point of inquiring of police officers in each case whether or not a pedestrian was endangered and will take this into account in determining the penalty to be assessed against those found guilty," the Judge added.

According to Judge Schutte there is no excuse for motorists falling to slow down and exercise special caution when they see a pedestrian or approach areas where pedestrians are likely to be found.

"Quite aside from the law," the Judge commented, "any motorist driving a ton of steel should display special courtesy for the man on foot who is the under dog in the traffic stream. Witnesses are frequently appalled at the discourteous motorist who scares a pedestrian half to death by just misusing him or splashes water or mud on his when it is raining."

In conclusion, Judge Schutte said, "I am displaying in my court room the official safety poster which reads, 'Darkness', 'Slippery Roads', 'Slow Down' as a reminder that the increasing number of hours of darkness which begin in the fall of the year require all motorists to drive more slowly. Those who fail to heed this advice and are found guilty of speeding after dark can expect especially firm treatment from this court."

U-M ART PROGRAM BENEFITS MICHIGAN SCHOOL CHILDREN

Michigan's rural school children are learning more about the best in art than are many others in the country because of a unique program being carried on by the University of Michigan.

Some 115 color prints of the old masters and the best in contemporary European and American art continually are being distributed to the state by the University of Michigan and actually are hung in the classrooms, where the students may see them for a month at a time.

The University's program was originated in 1948 to promote an interest in art and to let such children, who have little chance to visit big city museums, know that such things actually exist, according to Michael Church, supervisor of special projects for the U-M extension service.

All of the pictures now are in use. They are in various schools in Presque Isle, Kent and Lapeer Counties, as well as in several schools in Rogers City and Port Huron.

The prints were selected by the University's Museum of Art, and are distributed through the facilities of the U-M Audio-Visual Education Center, Presque Isle and Kent County hookmobiles also are assisting in circulating the pictures.

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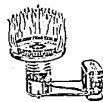
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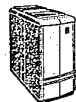
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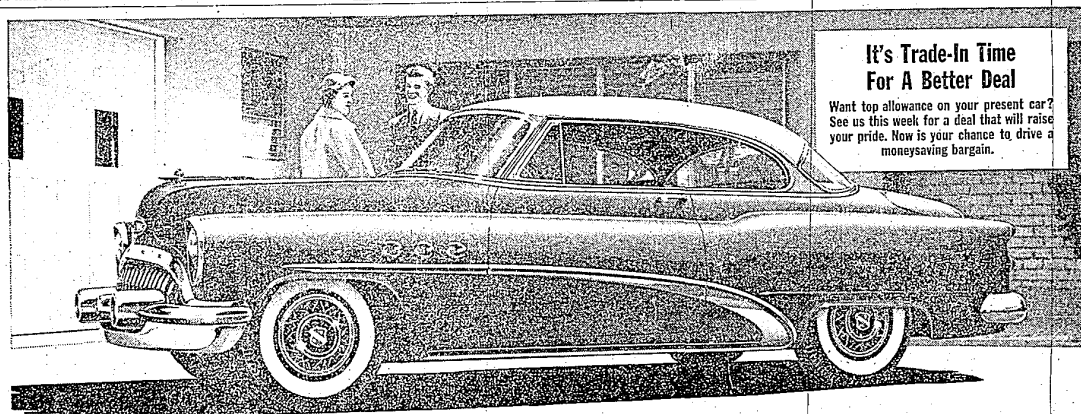
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
