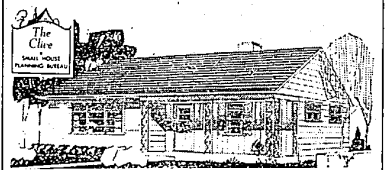

(Continued from Page One) Detroit and Grand River. At the present time the speed limit on the south side of Eight Mile Road in the City of Livonia is 25 miles per hour while the north side is 35 and 40 miles per hour. A similar letter was also received from the Clarenceville P. T. A.

The Board agreed to write a letter to the Oakland County Road Commission requesting a reduction in the speed limit to 25 miles per hour so that it would be uniform on both sides of the road.

The Board approved the drafting of a resolution requesting the State Legislature to provide for a census every five years. The resolution was approved following the receipt of legislation from the Troy Township Board. Under present laws only the Federal census, which is taken every ten years, is recognized. The purpose of the resolution is to allow for more immediate adjustment of population in regards to the diversion of sales tax monies to townships, cities and school districts.

The additional rooms would provide facilities for students through the sixth grade. The present wooden structure at the rear of the school could thus be used for other purposes.

Plans also include the addition of four classrooms at the new Westbrook Elementary School on Osamus Street. At the present time this new building is being completed and is expected to be ready for use in January.

Schmidt emphasized that the District has only made application for the \$200,000 in Federal Aid, and has no definite assurance of receiving it. The superintendent added that, possibly only a portion of the applied amount will be secured.
