

PLAN TROUT FISHING TALKS IN JANUARY

Public discussion of proposals to further restrict trout fishing on the Au Sable river and its branches is scheduled for January. With ever-increasing numbers of trout fishermen on the famous streams, conservation department fisheries authorities believe it may be necessary to increase legal size limits of trout to ten inches from the present seven inches and perhaps limit fishing to artificial flies only on all streams in the Au Sable river system.

CHICAGO SYMPHONY, JAMES MELTON TO BE IN DETROIT

The Chicago Symphony Orchestra, appearing in Masonic Auditorium Monday, December 14, will be directed by Fritz Reiner, one of the world's top great conductors. Born in Budapest, Hungary, Fritz Reiner held many coveted posts in Europe prior to his arrival in the United States in 1922 to take over the Cincinnati Symphony.

In 1931 he became head of the orchestral department and teacher of conducting at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia, and in 1932 he accepted the post of director of the Pittsburgh Symphony. After ten notable seasons there, he joined the Metropolitan Opera staff.

A welcome figure to Chicago for many years, Fritz Reiner had previously appeared as a guest with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at Orchestra Hall in March, 1950, and had conducted Ravinia Festival Concerts in 1937, 1948 and 1949.

James Melton, who will appear in Masonic Auditorium Friday, December 18, had his first taste of the concert field in 1934 during a whirlwind 28-day, 29-concert tour with the composer-pianist George Gerswin. After a career in motion pictures, in 1937 he forsook the field of popular music to establish himself as a serious artist of the concert and operatic worlds. The enormous number of concert engagements he fulfills annually attest to the soundness of his decision.

In 1935 Melton scored immediate success in his debut with the Cincinnati, Chicago and Metropolitan Opera Companies. Now he is one of the top singing stars on television, just as he has been on radio. He was the first to have his own TV show on a nationwide scale.

A happy combination of beautiful voice and personal magnetism has lifted James Melton to his present prominent position. As one critic stated, "No singing artist of the present day can match Melton's versatility in the interpretation of song literature."

State Timber Sales Highest On Record

Sales of state timber in October were the highest in the history of the conservation department, foresters report. Timber sold to operators of the 31 state forests brought more than \$52,350 to state coffers during the month. It was also the first time timber receipts exceeded \$50,000 for one month, the foresters say. They attribute the high sales to a better-than-average market for pulpwood.

Deer Have Laugh On Hunters In State

The observations of conservation department pilot Peter Van Valin while on aerial forest fire "smoke" patrol would raise the blood pressure of many a hunter. Besides detecting forest fires, Van Valin sees small groups of hunters sitting on runways with motionless deer only a few yards away. Latest aerial observation was one of Vanderbilt where one of the biggest deer he has ever seen was feeding near the front of a hunting cabin.
