TWO CONDEMNED BUILDINGS IN CITY REMOVED

Two of the three buildings recently condemned by the City Council as fire and safety hazards have been removed during the past week, James Tennant, City Manager, announced this week.

The buildings included the log cabin building, which was formerly located on Orchard Lake Road just north of Grand River, and the "tank" building on Grand River just east of Orchard Lake Road. The log cabin was removed from the property while the tank building was torn down.

Township Zoning Board Receives Proposed Change

The resolution of intention to change a parcel of land in the Middlebelt-Ten Mile Road area from residential to industrial has been filed with the Zoning Board for recommendations and a public hearing, Harry McBratner, Township Clerk, stated Monday.

Provides Minimum Requirements On Private Commercial Property

New ordinances setting up minimum off-street parking regulations on publicly and privately owned property and prohibiting the moving of buildings into or within the zoning districts were enacted by the Council at its regular meeting Monday evening.

Takes New Post

The Council also enacted a third ordinance, which forbids the abandonment of ice boxes without first removing the snap locks from the doors. Similar ordinances are being enacted by other municipalities in an effort to eliminate injury or death to children who might get caught inside one of these ice boxes. The new ordinance is to become effective on February 8.

Suggest Vacating Alleys In City

The Farmington City Planning Commission has recommended to the Council that the residential alleys in the eastern section of the city be vacated.
