**Falcons Retain League Lead At Van Dyke**

Fawcett Sinks 16; J. V. Wins No. 7

The Farmington Falcons got back in the victory trail last Friday night by turning back Van Dyke 16-10. John Fawcett led the assault for Farmington by carrying off the bench to score 16 points.

In the first quarter, the Falcons jumped off to a 10-9 lead with John McCaffrey and Ron Douglas each hitting for four points while Fawcett picked up two.

John Malone scored six quick points in the opening seconds of the second quarter, as Van Dyke led 16-10 edge. Then Fawcett started to find the range and pulled Farmington within two points. Captain Wayne Dryden then dropped in two points to tie the score 20-20 with only seconds remaining. Fawcett was then fouled while bringing the ball down the floor. His free throw was good, and Farmington took a 21-20 half-time lead.

Van Dyke outscored the Falcons in a slow-starting third period 9-7 to take a 29-25 lead going into the final stanza.

Farmington really poured it on in the last quarter. Fawcett scored a long shot with only fifteen seconds played to put the Falcons in the lead 30-29. Then with only 1:30 gone, McCaffrey scored on a jump shot and Van Dyke took a 33-29 lead. It took Van Dyke 5:50 before they could even score. In the meantime, the Falcons were scoring 18 points.

Farmington is leading the league by a full game. This Friday the Falcons will take on Southfield in another league tilt.

The Farmington J. V. put on an exhibition of fine shooting while beating Van Dyke 64-34 for their seventh straight win.

In the first quarter the Farmington team jumped off to a 25-8 lead. Shoquist and Nichols led the attack with six points each.

The second quarter was played by the second string who outscored Van Dyke 11-0. Ed Donnelly was high with five. The score at half time was 36-18 in favor of Farmington.

Starting the second half with his first string, Coach Pike scored eight points in order to keep the score down.

In the fourth quarter the J.V. added ten points to make the final score 64-34.

**Moses Ward, Young Detroit Hopeful, To Meet Willie Troy February 3**

Moses Ward, the sensational young Detroit middleweight champion, hopes to get his big chance in the next IBC headliner at the Olympia Stadium Wednesday, February 3.

The shock-punching Motor City warrior clashed with fast-rising Willie Troy of Washington, D. C. who is now ranked No. 8 among the challengers for Carl "Bobo" Olson's middleweight title.

This marks the first time that Troy, ranked as perhaps the finest first man developed here since Joe Louis' heyday. Nick Lardas, of the IBC, a persistent rival, tried for eight months to sign a top-ranking opponent for Ward before he finally persuaded Bill Troy's manager, to accept the match.

As recently as late November, Will turned Lardas down flat when he sought to sign Troy to Van Dyke. Troy was fresh from his kayo triumph over Randy Sandy, and he showed no desire to tangle with Ward.

Lardas also offered the match to such outstanding middleweights as Rocky Drastich, Yolande Penick, Joey Girolletto, Gil Turner, Paddy Young, Johnny Saxton and Eddie Durando, among others.

When Al Andrews withdrew from the projected match with Troy, Girolletto, first booked for February 13, Lardas suggested Ward as a substitute for Andrews. Girolletto turned it down.

Ward has been going great in recent months, despite limited opportunities. In 1953 he whipped Clarence Hinman and Irish Turner, Wilson, and kayoed Wilfredo Miro, Bob Boyd and Lou King.

Troy enjoyed a spectacular rise to stardom in 1952. He is one of the hottest young scrappers in the country today, a straight-away brawler who has become nationally known through his TV victories.

Troy won his last six bouts with kayoes, bludgeoning Bobby Bord, Lou Sala, Terry Moore, Randy Sandy, Charles Williams, and Tuzo Portugal. He has won 25 out of 31 straight before Holly Mimms stopped him in a notable upset. Troy has scored 19 knockouts in his 25 victories.

**Amateur Skiing Comes Of Age**

Amateur skiing in America comes of age this winter, and Michigan will celebrate with ten special ski events in February and March, according to the State Tourist Council. They will include races, championship tournaments, and cross-country skiing.

Twenty-one years ago the Olympic Games at Lake Placid gave the impetus to down-hill skiing as a recreational sport for amateurs. Since then it has achieved such popularity that upwards of a quarter of a million persons visit Michigan ski centers annually," commented Robert J. Parlons, executive secretary of the Tourist Council.

As a result of the sport's tremendous popularity, ski centers have sprung up in all parts of the state, from Kalamazoo and Pontiac in the south to the Porcupine Mountains and Ironwood in the Upper Peninsula. The 38 centers offer complete facilities to skiers of every degree of skill from novice to expert.

Additions and improvements have been made to most of the centers so that they are better equipped than ever to handle the record crowds expected this season. One of them, Boyne Mountain, has added an outdoor heated swimming pool, open year around.

A mecca for winter sportsmen, Michigan is the birthplace of the National Ski Association, which will celebrate its 50th anniversary at Ishpeming on February 21.
