GUSTAVUS CHOR TO SING MONDAY IN DETROIT

The Gustavus Choir from St. Peter, Minnesota, will appear in concert at Augustana Lutheran Church, 13740 Curtis Avenue, near 12 Mile and Highway, Detroit, on Monday 1 at 8:15 p.m.

Gustavus Adolphus College, the home of the choir, is a Lutheran college with an enrollment of about 700 students. The college, founded by Swedish pioneers, and most of the students are of Scandinavian descent. True to Swedish tradition, the love of choral music is one of the outstanding features of the school.

The choir has been touring each year since it was organized in 1930, with the necessary exception of the war years, and has earned itself a place of distinction in the minds of music lovers throughout the Midwest.

Professor Eugene Casselman, director of the Gustavus Choir, is a man of large experience in choral directing. He is a graduate of Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio; Westminster Choir College, Princeton, New Jersey, and also a former member of the Westminster Choir. He is also a graduate of the American Conservatory of Music, Chicago, Illinois. In addition to his work done at these colleges, he has studied voice with John C. Wilcox, Chicago, and with A. S. Dietrich, Detroit. Before taking up his duties on the Gustavus Adolphus campus, Mr. Casselman was voice teacher and choir director at Colorado College, Colorado Springs.
