Paced by Jerry Rice's 19 points, the Farmington Falcons beat the Berkley Bears last Friday night to remain in first place in the Southfield for the leadership of the Inter-Lakes League.

John Fawcett scored on a long shot with the game only 15 seconds old, and the Falcons never trailed throughout the rest of the game. Fawcett connected for seven points, Rice 5, and John McCaffrey 2, before the first quarter ended with Farmington holding a 14-9 lead.

The Falcons lost their range in the second quarter, but their defensive game stood out as they held Berkley to six points. Dick Ridgata, 6' 7" Berkley center, scored eight points while Don Dicksell kept the other two.

In the third period, Farmington scored 13 points while holding Berkley to 10, to take a 33-25 lead. Rice led the attack with six points, while McCaffrey and Jim Brewster were getting three and Chuck Maki one. Leonard led the Bears' scoring with five points. Rice had two, Ridgata two, and Maki one.

Farmington sewed the game up in the final period by making 19 points to Berkley's 12. Rice hit for eight points to lead the Farmington scorers in the fourth. He was followed by Fawcett with four and Maki with two.

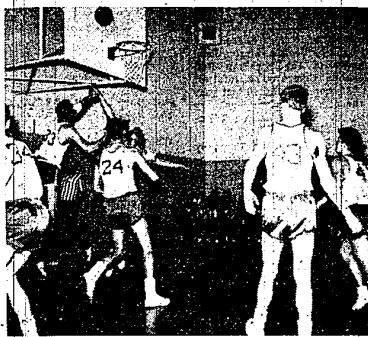

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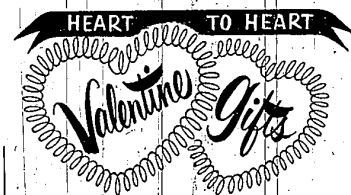
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
