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INTERVIEWS FOR GRAY LADIES AT STATE HOSPITAL

Representatives of the Detroit Chapter of the American Gray Ladies will be at the Northville State Hospital, 4101 Seven Mile Road, Thursday, April 15, and Tuesday, April 20, to interview women interested in serving as Gray Lady volunteers at the hospital.

Interviews will be held between 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. both days.

At the present time two Farmington women are serving at the hospital: Mrs. Jean Hohardt of 23422 Whitaker Road, and Mrs. Iola Desarmieux of 22318 Shilwaukee. Many more from Farmington area could be used.

To qualify for Gray Lady work one must be between the ages of 25 and 55, a high school graduate or its equivalent, and able to volunteer a minimum of 150 hours a year.

Following the recruitment drive there will be a three-day training course for all applicants accepted. This course will be given on April 22, 27 and 29.

An important part of the hospital's program of patient care and treatment, Gray Lady work consists of working directly with patients and assisting staff personnel with recreation and other projects for patients. Without Gray Lady assistants many patient activities would not be possible.
