The sites total more than 45,000 acres of public land bordering 1.1 million feet of water frontage.

Each of these general locations, O. E. Dunkel superintendent, disclosed.

A report was made to the Board by Superintendent Dunkel on the proposed construction of a single lane parking area and a sidewalk north of the school on Shilwassee. The Board authorized Dunkel to proceed with plans to have the work done and take whatever action necessary in getting the project under way.

Monday, Tennant pointed out that most of the area is serviced by four inch mains, which are too small, and also that the majority of the water taps are on the top of the line rather than the side. He added that plans for a water main of a water and pumping station on Oakland near Gill Road should eliminate the difficulty.

The securing of the new pump may require several weeks. The conversion of the 600 gallon unit, however, is now under way and should be completed by Friday. During the week end, city police will occasionally be detouring requesting residents to refrain from unnecessary use of water.

In the meantime, persons are requested to check their water faucets occasionally and govern their water usage on the amount of pressure available. Residents are being asked not to wash cars or water lawns until the situation is corrected.
