Proteins Needed During Day, Experts Advise

YMCA Has Varied Activity Program

DIRTY FIXTURES REDUCE LIGHT, HARD ON PURSE

You are being robbed daily if your lamp bulbs and shades are covered with dust and grease. This statement comes from Jess Marion, extension specialist in home furnishings at Michigan State College.

It is good economy as well as housekeeping to dust lamp fixtures the same as furniture. Jess Marion explains. Dust collecting on lamp bulbs, diffusing bulbs or shades can shut out considerable light. The home furnishing specialist says that when bulbs and boxes need waxing, turn the switch off, remove the bulb or bowl from the fixture or lamp.

Bulbs can be washed like any glassware, but bulbs and fluorescent tubes should not be dipped in water. They can best be cleaned when cool with a damp, soapy cloth and wiped dry. Make sure your hands are dry before replacing bulbs, cautions Miss Marion. Bulbs or tubes which still appear dark after cleaning should be replaced because they are deteriorating rapidly, and you are paying for light you're not getting.

Models are open for inspection at Ten Mile and Orchard Lake Road and at Ten Mile and Power Road. The new homes are rising on a series of curvilinear paved streets which follow the natural slope of the rolling countryside. Lots are spacious, ranging from 55 to 75 feet in width and 115 to 130 feet in depth.

Heart Disease Top Killer In State

Heart disease still outranks all other killers of Michigan people, Dr. Albert E. Hovels, state health commissioner, stated this week in reporting Michigan's leading causes of death for 1953.

Heart disease claimed the lives of one out of every three people who died in 1953. It was the cause of the heart disease of 22,425 of Michigan's 62,087 deaths last year.

Cancer was in second place, but caused less than half as many deaths as heart disease. One out of every six died of cancer. Blood vessel injuries or degeneration affecting the central nervous system largely apoplexy, ranked third in the causes of deaths. Accidents were in fourth place.

These four causes accounted for seven out of every ten deaths in Michigan last year. The remaining three in order of their number of fatalities were pneumonia and influenza, diabetes, arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries), insanity (premature birth), deformities existing at birth, nephritis (kidney disease), and those attributed to all other causes.
