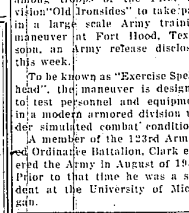
A tree or shrub will be given to each of the five elementary schools by the Garden Club in recognition of their summer interest.

A member of the 127th Armored Ordinance Battalion, Clark entered the Army in August of 1953. Prior to that time he was a student at the University of Michigan.

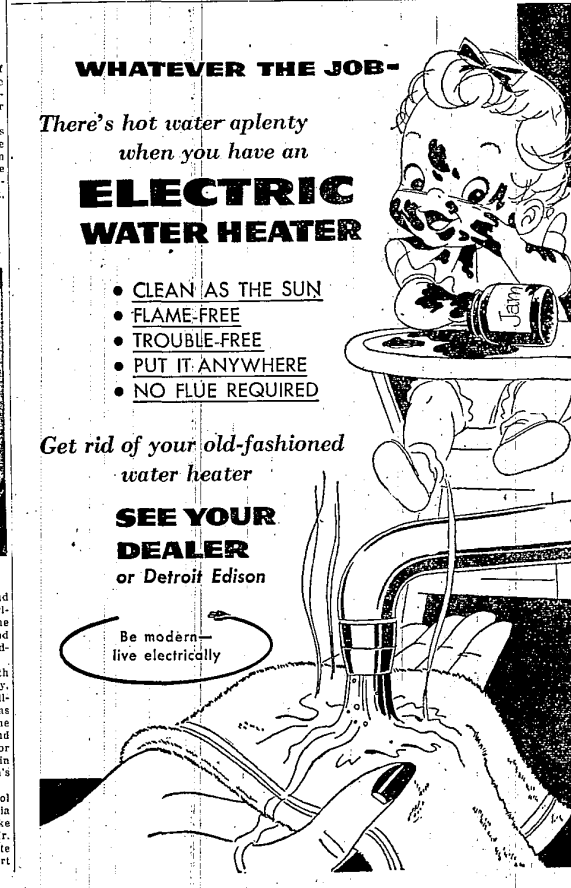
