# Let Cut Grass Lay, Expert Says

Allow the grass clippings when you mow the lawn to fall back upon the lawn, was the advice given on this controversial question to school gardeners and custodians at the 21st annual conference for Michigan School Custodians, held at Michigan State College this week.

Burt Ferris, superintendent of the grounds department, Michigan State College, in his lecture, said the grass clippings will act as a mulch, and will return plant foods and organic matter to the soil.

In general, he said, the best time to seed lawns in the Lower Peninsula is between August 15 and September 1. The four simple steps to assure a good lawn, Mr. Ferris said, are to use good seed and proper fertilizer, and then to water consistently and to keep it clipped.

In discussing the use of fertilizer on lawns he advised the use of a 12-6-6 combination, to be applied through twoler three light applications in early spring followed by 2 or 3 light applications in the late fall.

Two time-saving shortcuts were suggested to the school gardeners, Mr. Ferris said, do not plant shrubs and hedges that continually need pruning and keep leaves around shrub beds to eliminate the necessity of weeding.

Mr. Ferris urged the use of landscape gardeners to develop plans for the grounds around new school buildings.

More than 1,100 school aides attended the three-day conference.




