

## Local Hopefuls Invited To Tiger Trout Camp

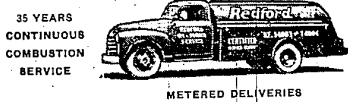
Young baseball hopefuls in the Farmington area, particularly those in the 17 to 22 year old group, are invited to a Tiger trout camp to be conducted in Dearborn from August 9 through 11. The camp is being sponsored by the Dearborn Recreation Department in cooperation with the Detroit Tigers.

The trout camp will run from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. daily. Applicants are requested to report in uniform and to bring a glove. Bats and catching equipment will be furnished. The instructions will be under the direction of John J. Mettala, director of the Detroit minor leagues system, assisted by James Campbell, Ralph Snyder, Jack Tighe, Pete Fox and Ray Meyers.

Following the trout camp, a picked group of boys will participate in a night baseball game.

Boys interested in trying out should report to the Dearborn Recreation area on the first day.

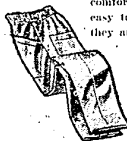

## GOVERNOR'S CUP TROT TO BE RUN AT NORTHVILLE FRIDAY

The annual \$10,000 Governor's Cup Trot will be held Friday night, July 9, at Northville Downs.

It is one of the two major Northville events of the season. The other is the \$10,000 Michigan Pacing Derby to be held Friday, July 23.

The Governor's Cup Trot has attracted a field that includes many of the best in the east and midwest. Fifteen trotters have been staked and Racing Secretary John Jennings believes that about a dozen will face the starter.

The list of nominations includes: Black Worthy, Bomb Slay, Castleworthy, Elby Hanover, Hi Lo's Apollo, Hi Lo's Victor, Jamie, Jochovolo, Lord Steward, Mackinac B, Maximilian, Morse Hanover, Nanny Song, Scotch Valley and Thunderation.

Thunderation won the 1951 Hambletonian and Morse Hanover was victor in the first heat of the 1952 Hambletonian. Lord Steward was the fastest trotter to show at Northville in 1953, making two trips that ranked with the fastest in the midwest. He went in 2:20 and 2:13 1/2 to winning successive heats in the \$5,000 Exchange Trot.

The first racing for the Governor's Cup at Northville was in 1945. The record is held by the great Proximity who trotted the mile in 2:02 4/5 in 1948.

## Little League Program Designed To Teach Sportsmanship And Fair Play

The citizens who administrate the Farmington Little League program met recently to carefully study and discuss the goals which they are trying to reach. Sportsmanship and fair play were established as the end result they hope to obtain, keeping the program on a high plane and above reproach.

The administration of the league has been excellent but the officials realize that certain evils could filter into it unless safeguards were established and a continuing effort made to constantly study and evaluate the league so that its place in the community would be a respected asset.

These men have set as their goal a program that will further develop boys physically, mentally and socially. Through participation in Little League Baseball they hope to promote in boys stamina, vitality, mental alertness, initiative and the ideals of community spirit and good citizenship.

Many criticisms of athletics are frequently made but these criticisms seldom question the previously stated values. The efforts of the league should tend itself to teaching these things. The competition should provide young boys with a healthy respect for their mates as well as for their opponents.

Realizing that the actions of Little League officials reflect directly upon the attitude of the players and that good sportsmanship and fair play result directly from the application of exemplary standards of conduct by the men who administrate the program, the following points were agreed upon as guiding principles:

1. To conduct the sport in such a way that it contributes to the well rounded education of the players.
2. To be fair and unprejudiced in relationships with the players.
3. To pay careful attention to the physical condition of players at all times.
4. To teach the players only legitimate and ethical means in trying to win.
5. All league officials' actions should be ethical and above criticism.

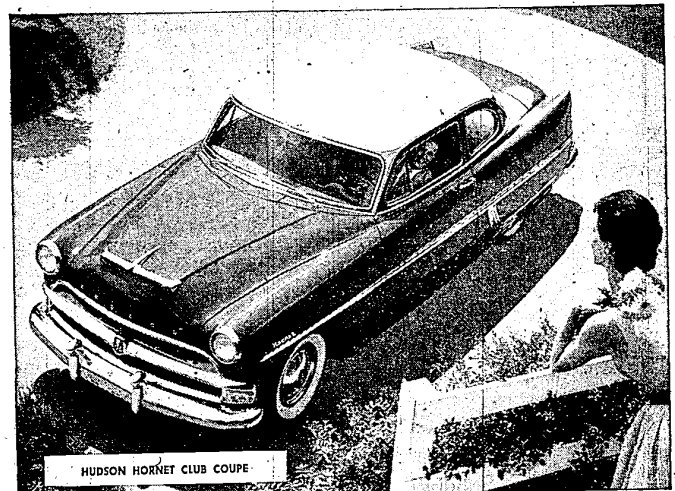
