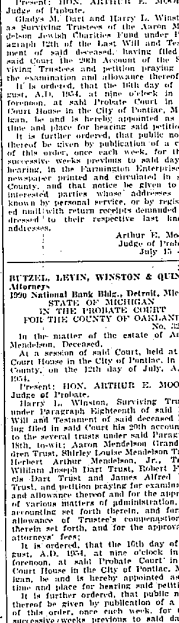

HIGH HOPE FOR NEW LOW FOREST FIRE RECORD THIS YEAR

Michigan appears headed for record low forest fire loss this year, although conservation department workers are keeping their fingers crossed.

At present, 3025 acres have been reported damaged by fire. To this date in the record low year of 1961, fires had damaged 3455 acres. The total loss this year was 4461 acres.

The reports cover all Michigan land, with the exception of the federal forest areas, which are protected by the U. S. Forest Service.

But Michigan still has to endure the late summer and autumn dry fall seasons when a combination of dry weather and no rain carelessly could wreck all the hopes for a new crop of lumber. Foresters say the continued protection of Michigan woodlands in recent decades is beginning to pay off. During each recent year there has been a fairly steady increase in total money dumped in the state treasury through sale of publicly-owned timber.

Paul J. Hays, state forest manager, says, "The state is getting more and more directly from the state forest fire suppression system."

State Police Arrest 13,712 During May

Michigan State Police made 13,712 arrests during May, including 12,755 for traffic offenses. In addition, the Department handled 7,362 complaints and 563 delinquent and wayward minors and juvenile traffic offenders.

Of 8,629 cases prosecuted during May, 7,822, or 91 per cent,


Troopers made 3,967 liquor and 22,588 property inspections.

East Lansing Headquarters received 4,758 criminal and 2,490 non-criminal fingerprints during May, and 23 persons were identified. Of 683 applicants for permits to carry concealed weapons, 74 were found to have criminal records.

"That was a wedding present 40 years ago," the woman cried. "I just can't sell this. It's about all I have left."

The old age investigator tutted, and reminded her that people on pensions must have valuable items in their homes.

The woman who wanted to be fully expected to be able to finish her last few years with dignity, broke down and wept. This rich and powerful state had callously ripped the last ounce of pride from her soul. It had humbled her and treated her as a beggar and thief.
