Springland Group Adopts By-Laws

The recently organized Springland Civic Association met Monday night, July 12, and after making minor changes passed upon by-laws for the Springland Subdivision development just off Orchard Lake Road between Eleven and Twelve Mile.

The change in the by-laws, as drawn up earlier, was made in the means of nominating an executive committee. Copies of the revised by-laws are now being made up and will be mailed to all residents in the subdivision as soon as they are completed.

A report to the association on developments in having speed limit signs erected in the subdivision was made by Harold O. Boucher. Boucher disclosed that a survey is now being made by the County Road Commission to determine how many signs will be needed and how much it will cost the group to have them erected.

The next meeting of the association has been scheduled for August 10.

An election of officers will be held September 1 for the new association. The newly elected officers will take office immediately and hold the positions until January of 1956. After that date, new officers will be elected annually.

Temporarily appointed officers are presently heading the organization. They are: Wesley I. Mitchell, president; Nancy Mitchell, secretary; and Harold O. Boucher, treasurer.


Conservation Law Violations Heavy

Area Blood Supply Dangerously Low

Worried American Red Cross leaders this week appealed to Oakland County people to boost local blood donations, "now running alarmingly low."

"We're using more blood in local hospitals every day than we're collecting in bloodmobile visits," said Dr. E. W. Bauer of Hazel Park, blood chairman for Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross.

Oakland County hospitals, which used 19 pints of blood a day in April to help people recover from sickness, accidents or surgery, cut their use to 15 pints a day in June.

Dr. John M. Mara, Pontiac General Hospital pathologist, explained hospitals are using medicines, plasma and other things "when available" to save on blood.

But Oakland County people only donated 353 pints of blood in June, or 12 pints a day — less than the 15 pints being used in hospitals.

Dr. Bauer urged clubs and organizations with blood banks to use July and August for "bloodmobile" visits.

"It's an ideal time from the organization's standpoint," he said. "The bloodmobiles aren't busy — they'll work almost any hours on any day in any spot where 100 people can be gathered together to give blood."

Organizations can get a bloodmobile visit by calling Red Cross offices in Royal Oak, Lincoln 2-6700, or Pontiac, Federal 4-3275.

Dr. Bauer hopes there'll be more bloodmobile visits in August. "We had only four in July," he said, "including the visit Tuesday, July 20th at Big Beaver Methodist Church, sponsored by Dynamic Manufacturing Company near Rochester."

TRAFFIC DEATHS SHOW SHARP RISE IN MONTH OF MAY

The downward trend in Michigan traffic accident fatalities that prevailed in January, March and April was halted again when 152 persons were killed during May, according to the monthly statistical report of the State Police.

The figure represented an increase of 18, or 13 per cent, over the same period last year, and was the highest reported for the month of May since 1941, when 193 persons lost their lives.

Injuries during May amounted to 4,777, or ten per cent below 5,304 in May of last year. Accidents were down 11 per cent from 16,092 to 14,358. Urban areas accounted for a substantial reduction in both injuries and accidents.

During the first five months of this year, 622 persons have been killed and 20,534 injured in 7,426 accidents. Compared to the same period last year, deaths were down 36, or five per cent, and injuries decreased 734, or three per cent. Reported accidents increased three per cent.

Estimated mileage for the first four months of 1954, the latest figures available, was 8.2 billion, an increase of four per cent over 7.8 billion in the same period last year. The death rate of 3.7 for each 100 million miles of travel showed a reduction of 15 per cent.

LEGAL NOTICE

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE OF FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP

A regular meeting of the Township Board of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, held on the 13th day of July, 1954, in the office of the Township Board of the said Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan.

The following members were present: Ernest Blanchard, Harry N. McCracken, Clayton Goers, Thomas Tardy, Fred Westlake, Ward Eagle, Ed Shafer.

The following members were absent: None.

The following resolution was introduced by Harry N. McCracken and supported by Ed Shafer. He it resolved that the Township Board of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, under the provisions of Act 246 of the Public Acts of 1945 as amended by Public Act 224 of the Public Acts of 1952, in order to secure the public peace, health, safety, welfare and convenience does hereby provide as follows:

1. That it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle within the right of way of a certain highway known as Grand River Avenue (U. S. 16) in said township between certain points on said highway as designated by a distance of 1,000 feet East of the intersection of said highway and 10 Mile Road and continuing in a westerly direction on said highway to a point 1,000 feet West of said intersection of Grand River Avenue and 10 Mile Road in said Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan.

Any firm, corporation or person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 for each offense or shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not to exceed 30 days for each offense or may be both fined and imprisoned as provided herein.

Prosecutions for the violation of this Ordinance shall be instituted in any one of the Justice's Courts of said township and the same right of appeal to the Circuit Courts shall exist as in cases of violations of the State law enforceable by a Justice of the Peace.

2. This Ordinance shall be published as provided in Act 191 of the Public Acts of 1939 by causing a true copy of this Ordinance to be inserted in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper circulating within said township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, which insertion shall be made within 10 days after the passage thereof.

3. This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after the publication of said Ordinance as above provided.

Re-Surfacing Concrete Can Be Done Very Easily

It's fairly easy to resurface a concrete walk that has chipped and eroded badly.

Cut out the worn spots to a depth of one inch and saturate the slab with water overnight. Then brush on a heavy-cream-like coat of cement and water. Don't put on too much; just enough to cover the chipped surface completely.

Mix one part cement, one part sand and one and one-half parts with wet burlap for several days.


