
### CIVIC GROUPS IN STATE INVITED TO ATTEND INSTITUTE

Civic organizations throughout the State of Michigan have been invited to send representatives to a University of Michigan institute on Friday, August 20, at which improved methods for selecting judges will be discussed.

The institute is sponsored by the University of Michigan Law School and Summer Session in cooperation with the State Bar of Michigan. Professor Charles W. Joiner reports that the organizations are being asked to send a team made up of a lawyer and a layman to the institute. "We hope that these teams will carry back to their organizations an explanation of the Michigan Plan for selecting judges," Professor Joiner reports.

Invitations have gone out to the following clubs: Rotary, Kiwanis, Exchange, Optimists, and Kiwanis, as well as to chambers of commerce, Farm Bureaus, Granges, League of Women Voters, and labor unions.

### NEW GREYHOUND SCENICRUISER



Here is the first of a fleet of 500 new dual-level Scenicruiser highway coaches being delivered to Greyhound Lines by the GMC Truck and Coach Division of General Motors Corp. ### STATE INSPECTORS FIND SHORT WEIGHTS IN SOME ITEMS OF PRE-PACKAGED FOOD

Spot checking of weights on pre-packaged food offered in grocery stores throughout the state disclosed 3,117 instances of short weight out of 8,854 packages tested last month.

This is shown in a report submitted to G. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, recently by the department's chief of the bureau of marketing and enforcement, Miles A. Nelson.

Mr. Nelson explains that while there were 2,117 instances of short weight, actually the amount is low in comparison with the hundreds of thousands of packages offered to housewives. Just a few inaccurate scales could easily account for all of the instances of short weight. Inaccurate scales amounted to 11 per cent of those tested. Overweight was found as well as underweight.

"In other words," said Mr. Nelson, "where a spot check in a store discloses an incorrect weight on a package, all other packages in the lot are checked. This boosts the short weight total by that amount. In another store a check of 10 packages, all correct, would only increase the total packages checked by 10. This accounts for the comparatively high percentage of short weight found in relation to total packages inspected."

Nevertheless inspectors of the Michigan Department of Agriculture are constantly visiting stores throughout the state searching for short weight and other violations. The duties are many because sanitation, adulteration, false advertising, misbranding must be watched as well.

### SENDING TROUT TO SCHOOL IS HELPFUL, EXPERIMENT SHOWS

Michigan's pioneer experiment in "training" trout indicates, according to the research workers involved, that the work has been "significantly" successful.

State officials have received a preliminary report from Psychological Research Services, Inc., the independent group that under conservation department contract has been "sending trout to school" at Oden hatchery during the last year.

The report says that, compared to untrained trout, the trained fish showed a higher rate of winter survival and that the angler's catch of trained trout was more evenly distributed over a long period of time.

These have long been two of the biggest problems in trout planting work. The fish were always too easy as targets for the fisherman's lure and few ever survive opening week of the season.

Also, experiments showed that hatchery fish rarely lived through the winter when planted in streams or lakes after the close of trout season.

The psychological experiment was an attempt to teach the fish, while in hatchery ponds, how to live after release in natural streams.

The report says the trained fish also proved their superiority to untrained fish by avoiding anglers with studious caution.

Michigan's improved financial situation, with the state operating in black for the first time in years, makes excellent campaign material. Republicans point with pride to "their" legislative program that made it possible to eradicate deficits of \$65 million.

Moving forward due days for corporation taxes and passing the business receipts tax are responsible for the happy financial state. GOP supporters are quick to point out that Williams supported neither move.

Democrats, however, refer to the end of red ink operation as a "joint achievement." "The solution was not to everyone's liking," they say, "but at least it worked."

Despite the vigorous activity in primary campaigns, the hot battle is expected to take place before the general election in November. Each party machine will make every effort to win Michigan into its camp.

Whether the Wolverine state sends a Republican or Democrat senator to Washington is a question which has immense significance at the national level. With so much at stake, and the situation as unpredictable as political observers believe it to be, no time will be lost when the primary is over.

Stakes will be higher in the fall balloting; the campaigning will be harder.
