Blood In County Critically Short, Donor Drive On

A new Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, executive blood committee is now operating to try to help solve a blood shortage so serious it has emptied the Detroit Regional Blood Center.

"We're out of blood — just plain out," Dr. E. W. Bauer of Hazel Park, blood program chairman, stated this week. "This is the most critical blood crisis in local Red Cross history. If there's any group, any community anywhere in Oakland County that can get 100 people together to give blood, please call Red Cross chapter offices. We'll schedule a Bloodmobile visit. We've never needed it more."

The new committee, headed by Mrs. V. Van Fleet of Birmingham, vice-chairman of the county-wide Red Cross blood program, is tackling an emergency job, Dr. Bauer pointed out.

"Pontiac General Hospital was down to eight pints of blood last week," he said. "They should have 100 at least. Two patients there needed blood. The Red Cross could not supply it. The hospital had to appeal for volunteer donors for the first time in years."

"People are giving blood at scattered Bloodmobile visits throughout the Detroit region," Dr. Bauer said. "Royal Oak gave 103 pints last week. It was gone in 24 hours. We can't keep up with the demand — the mobiles are too far apart."

"If we have a train wreck, a hotel fire, a bus collision — anything that puts a dozen people in need of blood — we're going to be in trouble," he said. "Somebody may die because that blood just isn't there."

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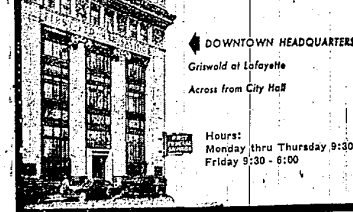
