Recreation Area Guides Available

A new guide to metropolitan recreation issued by the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority makes it easy to get to H-C-M-A facilities, and also state recreation spots in the five counties of the Detroit metropolitan area.

The three full-color guide, about the size of a state highway map, covers the five counties represented by the public park and parkway authority — Livingston, Macomb, Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne.

One side is a large map of the five counties, showing present and proposed installations. On the other side are detail maps and statistics on facilities and recreational opportunities in the five Metropolitan Authority parks — Metropolitan Beach on Lake St. Clair, Marshbank Metropolitan Park near Pontiac, Kensington Metropolitan Park near New Hudson, Dexter — Huron Metropolitan Park near Ann Arbor, and Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville.

The guides are available free from boards and chambers of commerce and Automobile Club offices throughout the five-county area and also at the Detroit office of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, 1750 Guardian Building, Detroit 26, telephone W-6425.

First Car Ferry Service Started In State In 1892

The first car ferry service across a great body of water was initiated in 1892 by the Toledo Ann Arbor, and North Michigan Railroad, according to information in the Michigan Historical Collections (MHC) at the University of Michigan. The first especially designated ship loaded with 24 freight cars crossed Lake Michigan from Frankfort, Michigan to Kewauqua, Wisconsin, November 24, 1892. Shippers at first were unwilling to trust their cargoes to the ferry for fear that it would sink under the burden of the loaded cars, says Dr. F. Clever Bald of the MHC.
