Orbit Plans New Appliance Service

a quarterly basis. The ordinance provides for the payment of a debt service charge up to \$400 in addition to regular water use charges. Under the new amendment customers will be allowed to pay off the balance of the debt service in full. The second resolution provides that repair charges to meters or service lines between the property boundary and building are to be billed to the customer.

Fred Westlake, Board Trustee and member of the Citizens' Water Committee, asked the Board if it could be made a condition whereby citizens in the southern and eastern section of the township could fill containers from an outlet in the Section 26 system. He stated that at the present time some residents travel as far as Northville to secure water. The Board agreed to investigate the possibility of using facilities at the Clarencville Fire Hall on Wheeler Street.

Following a report from a representative of the State Department of Agriculture regarding the presence of Japanese beetles in the eastern section of the township, the Board approved a motion allocating \$750 for the purchase of insecticide to control the spread of the beetles. The State will take care of the application of the insecticide.

A petition was filed with the Board requesting a change in the zoning ordinance in regard to a piece of property on Fourteenth Mile Road just east of Middlebelt. The request is for a rezoning from Residential 4 to Residential 3. According to the petition, the property is to be developed into homesites with sewer and water facilities as well as hard topped roads. The developers stated that if these improvements are to be provided smaller lot areas will be necessary. The property contains approximately 92 acres and would include about 225 lots. The Board delayed action pending receipt of a proposed plat layout.

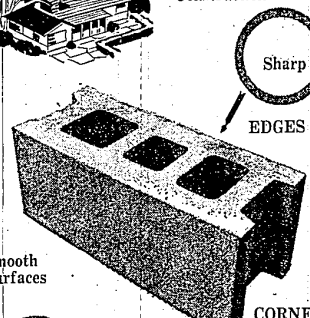

The Board after lengthy discussion. A majority vote was registered by Board members against the continuance of the character education program taught by persons not employed by the School Board.

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COMMERCIAL FISHING IN GREAT LAKES DOWN DURING 1953

Michigan's Great Lakes waters in 1953 produced 25,012,789 pounds of fish at a total value to commercial fishermen of \$3,314,696, according to figures released by the conservation department.

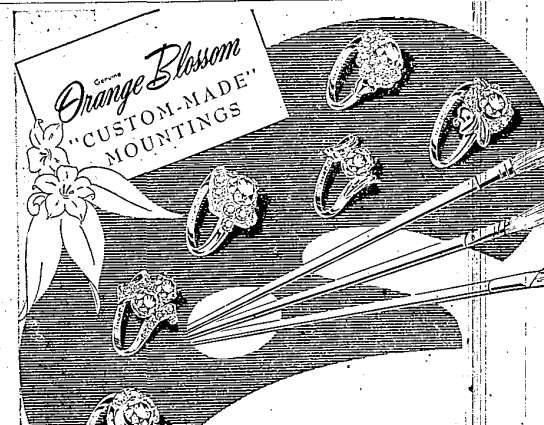
The 1953 total was down somewhat from the 29,231,823 pounds taken in 1952. Total value that year was estimated at \$4,161,836.

Men in the conservation department's fish division are of the opinion that this year's take will not vary greatly from that of 1953. The report for last year, shows Lake Michigan as the most productive with 15,874,756 pounds of fish. Lake Huron was second with 6,118,079 pounds, followed by Lake Superior with 5,813,715 and Lake Erie, 1,395,273.

Twenty-five different kinds of fish were included in the report for 1953. They ranged from giant suckers from Lakes Michigan, Superior and Huron to goldfish from Lake Erie.

Approximately 6,000 cars per hour is the maximum estimated for the new bridge at the Straits of Mackinac.
