A meeting of the Township Board for the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, was held in the offices of said township at the Town Hall in the City of Farmington on the 14th day of following members were present:
Ernest Blanchard, Harry McCracken, Clayton Gours, Ward Engle, Elmer May, Edward H. Shafter, C. F. Westlake.
The following members were absent: None.
The following resolution was offered by Edward H. Shafter and supported by C. F. Westlake:
That Section 7 of the Ordinance of the Township of Farmington entitled:

An ordinance authorizing the construction of a water supply system for a part of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, authorizing and providing for the issuance of self-liquidating revenue bonds of the Township of Farmington for the purpose of defraying the cost of such water supply system under the provisions of Act No. 94 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1932, as amended, and prescribing all the details of said bonds, providing for the fixing, collection, segregation and disposition of the revenues of said water supply system, including appurtenances and extensions thereof, for the purpose of paying the cost of operation and maintenance thereof, providing an adequate depreciation fund therefor, and the payment of said bonds, and providing for a statutory lien in favor of the holder or holders of said bonds, upon the whole of such revenues.
Upon a Roll-call vote the resolution was carried as amended and adopted.

ORDINANCE 1
An ordinance to amend Section 7 of ordinance of the Township of Farmington entitled:
"An ordinance authorizing the construction of a water supply system for a part of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, authorizing and providing for the issuance of self-liquidating revenue bonds of the Township of Farmington for the purpose of defraying the cost of such water supply system under the provisions of Act No. 94 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1932, as amended, and prescribing all the details of said bonds, providing for the fixing, collection, segregation and disposition of the revenues of said water supply system, including appurtenances and extensions thereof, for the purpose of paying the cost of operation and maintenance thereof, providing an adequate depreciation fund therefor, and the payment of the principal and interest on said bonds, and providing for a statutory lien in favor of the holder or holders of said bonds, upon the whole of such revenues."
WHEREAS, Matthew Carey, Receiver of the Section 36 Water Supply System of the Township of Farmington has recommended that certain changes be made in the rate structure of the above entitled Ordinance;
AND WHEREAS, said changes were approved by order of the Hon. Arthur A. Koscinski, Federal Judge, entered on March 2, 1952, together with Supplemental and

LEGAL NOTICE

Amended Order entered March 24, 1952, in the case of Warrenville State Bank, et al v. Township of Farmington, et al, before the No. 21 United States District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan, Southern Division, at Farmington, Michigan.
Section 1. Section 7 of Ordinance of the Township of Farmington, entitled in the preamble hereto, be amended to provide as follows:
Section 7. The rates for services of water furnished by said Water Supply System shall be levied upon, and payment thereof shall be collected from, each lot or parcel of land, building or premises having any water connection with said Water Supply System, on the basis of the quantity of water used thereon or therein as the same is measured by the Township Water meter and thereon at the time and in the manner provided by the Township Board. The Township Board may classify the users of water according to the quantity of water used, and charge said rates to users in each class as it may deem reasonable. Such classification and rates for water are hereby fixed as follows: the rates being quarterly rates for the specified amount of water furnished quarterly:
For the first 1,000 cubic feet or any part thereof \$2.75
For the next 9,000 cubic feet per thousand 1.25
For the next 90,000 cubic feet per thousand 2.94
For all over 100,000 cubic feet per thousand 3.75
The foregoing rates shall not be connected with existing mains now furnished water by the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Detroit. Such customers shall be furnished water at the same rate as now in effect, which rate is termed the "Detroit Suburban Rate."
An additional rate of \$4.75 per quarter, termed the "Debt Service Rate," shall be charged in addition to the foregoing rates against all customers furnished water through service connections made to water mains installed and paid for from the receipts from the sale of revenue bonds authorized by this Ordinance. The total charges shall aggregate Two Hundred Forty (\$240.00) Dollars: provided that, any customer who, at any time, pay the aggregate amount of future due quarterly charges, subject to discount at the rate of two and one-half (2 1/2%) per cent per annum in accordance with tables prepared by the Water Board, all such discounted payments of future due quarterly charges shall be deposited in the fund and interest Redemption Fund and held for the retirement of callable bonds.
The above water and debt service rates shall be placed in effect as soon as the system, or any part of the system, is constructed and placed in operation or taken over from the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Detroit.
The Township Board may establish special rates and charges for service connections to customers whose premises are not contiguous to the distribution system. The Township shall pay out of the appropriate general funds of the Township the reasonable cost and value of the water furnished or services rendered to the Township by such Water Supply System on the basis of the foregoing schedule of rates and amounts of water used by the Township.
All charges against lots, parcels of land, buildings or premises shall constitute a lien on the property served by such connections, and if not paid within ninety days from due date shall be collected in the same manner as general taxes of the Township.
Section 2. The Township Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Township, and the Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after such publication.
