COUNTY HAS 5,611 GOOD REASONS FOR INTEREST IN USO

Oakland County has 5,611 reasons for being interested in the USO these days, and many of these reasons are from Farmington City and Township. This is the number of young men this county has serving in the armed forces, according to the July 31 report of the Michigan Selective Service Commission.
Although many people today think that because the Korean War is over there is no need for the USO, statistics do not uphold this fact. There are 3,500-4,000 men in service today; 58,022 of them are from Michigan. This is approximately one-third of these men in service are stationed overseas.
Statistics show that approximately 30% of the men in service today are under the age of 30. Most of them, moreover, are not military by nature. They are civilians at heart, diverted for the time being to an unfamiliar and uncomfortable, but essential, job. They are giving two or more years of their lives because the welfare of everyone depends on it.
Those who are safely at home, doing the things they want to do, owe these young men as much of the atmosphere of home, warmth and friendliness as can be provided for them wherever they are stationed. This is the type of job the USO is seeking to provide. As of the first of this year, USO was operating 217 clubs in the continental United States and 17 overseas. Although these units are doing a tremendous job, service men made 52,000,000 visits to USO centers last year, many more clubs are needed. These will only become a reality if thousands of individual American citizens see the great need for USO services and give more generously to their local United Fund and Community Chest campaigns. More adequate services are needed in Alaska, Guam, Japan, Philippines, France, Turkey, North Africa, Italy and Germany.

A RESOLUTION
A meeting of the Township Board for the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, was held in the offices of said Township at the Town Hall in Farmington, Michigan, on the 14th day of September, A. D. 1954. The following members were present: Ernest Blanchard, Harry McCracken, Clayton Goers, Ward Eagle, Thomas Tard, Edward H. Shaffer, C. P. Westlake.
The following members were absent: None.
The following resolution was offered by Edward H. Shaffer and sanctioned by Clayton Goers:
That Article V of Section V of the Ordinance of the Township of Farmington entitled:
"Providing for the management, control, construction, maintenance and operation of the water supply system of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, and of the Township of Westland, Michigan, and fixing rates to be charged for the use of water and the collection thereof, and establishing rules and regulations for the use and protection of the water works and water supply, and for any extension thereof and providing penalties for violations of the provisions thereof," be amended in accordance with the provisions of the attached ordinance.
That a Roll-call vote the resolution was declared adopted.
ORDINANCE II
An Ordinance providing for the management, control, construction, maintenance and operation of the water supply system of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, and any extension thereof, establishing rules and regulations for the use of water and the collection thereof, and establishing rules and regulations for the use and protection of the water works and water supply, and for any extension thereof and providing penalties for violations of the provisions thereof.
WHEAS, Matthew Carey, Receiver of the Section 36 Water Supply System of the Township of Farmington, has recommended that certain changes be made in the above-entitled Ordinance.
AND WHEREAS, said changes were approved by order of the Hon. Arthur A. Koresinski, Federal Judge, entered on 10/1/54, together with Supplemental and Amended Order entered March 23, 1953, in the case of the Township of Farmington, et al. being file No. 7021 in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan, Southern Division.
The Township of Farmington Ordinance:
Section 1, Article 23 of Section V of Ordinance of the Township of Farmington, entitled in the preamble hereto, be amended to provide as follows:
Article 23. Repair charges shall be made to the customer for all damages occurring to meters due to the carelessness or negligence on the part of the customer, and any maintenance required on that portion of the service pipe between the property line and customer's building.
Section 2. The Township Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be published within ten (10) days after its adoption in a newspaper of general circulation in the Township, and the Ordinance will be in full force and effect on and after such publication.
