There are several basic reasons for the endorsement of this program, which has been recommended to the City Council by the Planning Commission. First and foremost, it is a blueprint for the orderly and balanced growth of the community. As the Enterprise has stated before, if the residents of Farmington want better schools and improved public services, a sound tax base must be established. It is impossible for most communities to finance these necessary services without a sizeable nucleus of commercial and diversified industrial facilities to draw from. If it is left entirely to home owners, the tax burden becomes too heavy to bear.

Second, this plan is an instrument for the future development of commercial services necessary in any growing area. If the residents are to have the stores and business places they need, if an adequate and convenient shopping area is to be developed, a plan must be established now, while there is still suitable land available. The proposal of the Planning Commission not only provides for these necessary facilities, but is so located as to tie into the present commercial area.
