

HAVE YOU GOT A...?

Q. . . . I would like to know how I may address letters to Our Lady of Sorrows Church.

A. . . . Letters to the church should be mailed to the priest's home, addressed as follows: Our Lady of Sorrows, 2813 Powers Road, Farmington, Michigan. The address is listed in the phone book under (Sheahan, Thos. P. Rev.). To help you and other new residents moving into the area, we suggest that you request from church officials that the name of the church be listed in the phone book in the future.

Q. . . . When drinking water is sent in for an analysis, how are people to know what the marks indicate on the return check? Why don't we print the meaning of each marking? Also, how long do you boil water to make it safe for drinking?

A. . . . The chart returned to you is the bacteriologist report in photostat form. The upper portion of the chart is the bacteriologist's report and you should not concern yourself with them. All that you should pay heed to is the coliform index listed below and the remark as to whether the water is safe to drink as indicated. If the coliform index space is checked, human refuse is entering the water and it is definitely unsafe. To make water fit for drinking it should be boiled at a "brisk boil" for at least ten minutes.

Q. . . . When are they going to have a garbage and rubbish pickup in the 10 Mile and 11 Mile Orchard Lake Road district?

A. . . . A township-wide rubbish collection is expected to be held within a short time. Such collections are held semi-annually in the spring and fall at the direction of the Township Board. There is no community garbage

Commissioner seems a little suspicious about the voters' motives. He appears to worry that Williams is applying pressure for reports because of political reasons rather than an actual desire for knowledge.

Answer to the latest such request was sent in a letter to the governor. The first paragraph read: "This will acknowledge your letter of September 15, in which you request an enormous amount of detailed information and statistics to supplement reports which have previously made in complete accordance with the provisions of Act 11, P. A. of 1951."

Other sentences describe the busy activity in the department. The letter ends with a reference to a report now being accumulated and the curt information that it will be ready for the 1953 Legislature.

MORE SALES TAX per person is collected from Michigan residents than from any other state except Wyoming according to Louis M. Nims, State Revenue Commissioner. In 1953-54 Michigan people paid an average of \$42.21 each, the per capita rate for Wyoming is \$42.95, only 77 cents higher than the Wolverine state.

In 27 states which have sales tax, the average collection per person averaged to \$28.88, California was third with \$38.04.

Nims said Michigan's rate is high because the state's income is very high, the tax base is very broad, and the department works very hard to collect it.

Sales tax income for August increased over previous months for the first time in many months, reports Clarence W. Lock, deputy state revenue commissioner. Collections (for July business) amounted to \$23,528,561. This is \$105,000 above July, 1954.

A TRI-COUNTY airport to serve Macomb, Oakland and eastern Wayne is subject for a campaign of the Detroit Board of Commerce. A committee of leading citizens of the three counties has formed with Roy Pruehauf, commercial trailer manufacturer, as chairman.

VARIETY OF SIGHTS TO BE OFFERED IN SKY IN OCTOBER

The Hunter's moon, bright competition for the sun, the Milky Way and meteor showers are the billing of October's astronomical attractions, according to Janet M. Leach, associate professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan.

A great boon for hunters because of its plentiful light, the moon will reach its full phase on October 11.

The sun's competition, she continues, comes from the star, Capella, third brightest one visible from the northern latitudes. If the earth were placed between Capella and the Sun, the former would send us more than 100 times as much light as the Sun.

The star, called "The Goat", rises in the northeast at sunset and is followed by the rest of the constellation Aries, a five-sided figure with Capella at one of its corners.

Miss Losh points out that the Milky Way will be an attraction across the sky from the northeast to southwest, with the Northern Cross almost directly overhead.

The professor adds that there are two meteor showers scheduled for October, the Draconids around October 9 and the Orionids around October 22. She says they will be "scanty showers" with just a few stragglers visible here and there.
