First Federal Savings Celebrating 20th Anniversary With Open House

First Federal Savings of Detroit, Michigan's largest savings association, is celebrating its 20th Anniversary with an Open House starting Monday, October 11th, at all 7 offices of the association. The Redford office is at Grand River and McNichols.

There'll be special gifts for all who stop in, including a 32-page book of the Favorite Verses of Edgar A. Guest, Detroit's own nationally-recognized poet of the home. Other useful souvenir gifts will also be on hand for visitors during the Anniversary celebration.

During the Anniversary celebration, all who open new savings accounts with \$10 or more will be presented with an Eversharp Star Reporter Pen and Pencil set, or with an Add-O-Bank, that registers and records nickels, dimes and quarters.

At the end of its first two decades, First Federal's record of growth is an impressive one. Opening its doors in 1934, they began operations with an original investment of \$125,000. By the end of 1934, this had grown to \$160,000, and within another year, assets were already over a million dollars and the association ranked first in size among Michigan's savings and loan associations.

Purposes of the association are set forth in its charter from the Federal Home Loan Bank: "To promote thrift by providing a convenient method for people to save and invest money and to provide for the sound economical financing of homes."

The Federal savings and loan system of which First Federal is a part was set up by Act of Congress in 1923. Just before First Federal of Detroit was organized, it represents a streamline of the savings and loan idea which has been part of the American scene since 1831. It embodied the features of mutuality, local management, encouragement of small savers, and financing of homes through monthly-payment loans that bring debt-free home ownership.

It added the great strength of a reserve system for all federal member associations: the Federal Home Loan Bank System. And the feature of insurance of savings by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.

First Federal serves 78,000 savings customers with flexible and helpful savings plans. Savings accounts may be opened with any amount; additions and withdrawals may be made in person or by mail. Two per cent current rate is paid on savings, which are insured to \$10,000 by Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, a U.S. Government agency. Other services include Christmas and Vacation Clubs, home modernization loans, money orders, travelers' checks, and deposit boxes (available at downtown, Grand River and Gratiot offices only).

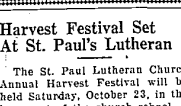
Harvest Festival Set At St. Paul's Lutheran

Lt. Brennan Cited For Work In Korea

First Lieutenant William H. Brennan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh F. Brennan of 23215 Powers, was the recipient of a commendation ribbon with metal pendant recently for meritorious service in Korea.

A member of the Support Group, United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission, 680th Army Unit, he was cited for service from December 5, 1953, to July 25, 1954, in Korea. As a telephone and telegraph officer, the Army Stated, Brennan was instrumental in supervising the construction, installation and maintenance of cable and wire lines from the Military Armistice Commission at Munsan-ni to the Custodian Force in the demilitarized zone in India and other units in these and nearby areas. Faced with unprecedented requirements, he provided reliable and efficient communications for numerous United Nations and neutral nations agencies and worked constantly to assure that requisites for communications were promptly fulfilled, the Army said. He was also cited for his tact, diplomacy and friendliness in carrying on successful operations with United Nations personnel with whom he coordinated his activities.

Servicemen in 560 camps and hospitals received Red Cross demands from paid staff and from volunteers during the fiscal year 1962-53.
