## DEFINITE LAWS CONCERNING TB IN FORCE IN MICHIGAN

Tuberculosis is covered by laws in Michigan, stated Dr. David J. Sencer of the University of Michigan.

The laws state that as tuberculosis is a communicable disease, dangerous to the public health, physicians are required to report all such cases to the health officer. Laws further state that it is the duty of the health officer to provide such care, isolation or hospitalization as the victim requires.

Stipulations are also made that public funds expended for hospital care and treatment of the tubercular person shall be defined as "expenditures for the protection of the public health and not as monies advanced in the nature of welfare or relief." Such expenses, therefore, need not be repaid.

Neither must a person exhaust his income or savings, sign over his home, or otherwise suffer financial insecurity for himself or his dependent in order to pay the cost of tuberculosis care and treatment, laws proclaim.
