

REASON GIVEN FOR NOT GETTING TAX STATEMENTS

Clayton Goers, Township Treasurer, stated this week that his office should be notified at once of any change of property ownership in order to insure the proper mailing to tax statements.

The notification was contained in a letter to Dr. Joseph Gadwah, chairman of the Citizens' Water Committee. Dr. Gadwah had asked the question after a number of property owners in the southern section of the township had claimed they had not received statements during the 1954 tax period.

Goers stated that in the event of property changing hands where neither the buyer nor seller gave notification, the treasurer is obligated to follow the tax rolls and the result that the proper person doesn't always receive the notice. Persons are requested to notify the township office of the name, address, lot number and subdivision, where a change of ownership has taken place. This can be done in person or by calling Farmington 1932.

military service during the "Korean War". The fourth proposed amendment to the State Constitution would permit the Legislature to authorize lotteries to be conducted by and lottery tickets sold by non-profitable charitable organizations. Both the City and Township Clerks urged voters to be familiar with the proposals before they come to the polls.

The County Court House and office building proposal reads "shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 31, 1952, be increased for a period of 20 years from 1955 to 1974, be inclusive, by 1/20th of 1% of the assessed valuation as equalized?"

The levy is being requested for the purpose of paying principal and interest on bonds aggregating not to exceed \$4,500,000 in principal amount, to be issued to pay the cost of erecting a county building in the City of Pontiac, to house courts and general county offices.

discussed briefly with Farmington Township officials although no progress can be made until authority has been received from the State. Such authority is necessary because the proposal covers more than one municipality or unit of government.

Regardless of the outcome of the conference, work is continuing on the drafting of plans for the city sewage disposal plant. Tenant pointed out that the establishment of an authority may not greatly alter the city's plans since an over-all program might require the establishment of several such plants located throughout the area. However, it would reduce the cost of the entire project and provide adequate service for a much larger number of people.

tees Thomas Tardy and Fred Westlake that a new 1955 Ford police car has been ordered from the Berling - McHugh Agency. It is expected to be delivered about December 1. The Board, at its last meeting, authorized Tardy and Westlake to proceed with the purchase.

The Township Zoning Board has recommended that the rezoning not be granted and the proposal has been forwarded to the Oakland County Zoning Board for consideration.

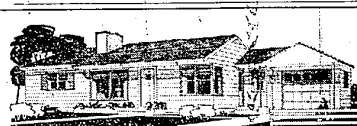

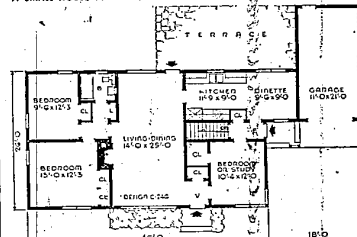

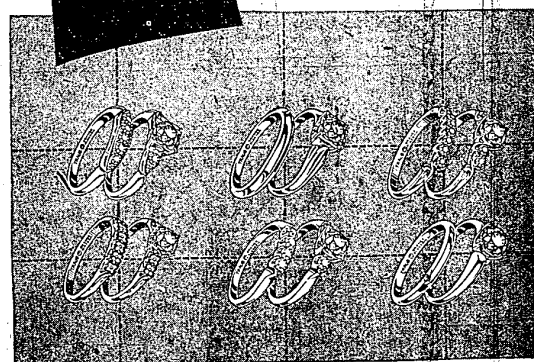
