LIVONIA RETARDED CHILDREN'S GROUP EXTENDS AREA

At the November 12 meeting of the Livonia Council for Retarded Children it was voted by the members to extend the area covered by this group and to change its name to "Northwest Council for Retarded Children."

Due to the fact that many inquiries have been received from communities surrounding Livonia, including Farmington, membership will now be open to parents or anyone interested in the welfare of retarded children in this area.

The Northwest Council is a non-profit organization, without dues, dedicated to the following purposes: to further public education, as well as parent education, in connection with the retarded child in order to prevent misunderstanding resulting from the lack of public knowledge or due to superstition and prejudice; to obtain recognition of the necessity of aid for these children; to improve the care, training, education and rehabilitation and to promote the general welfare of the mentally retarded.

Meetings are held on the second Friday of each month at 8:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the First Federal Savings Bank of Detroit, Sheldon Center, Plymouth Road at Farmington Road, in Livonia. Present Iron Lung To Hospital



In memory of Joan Phyllis Walls, who died in October, 1952, after contracting bulbar polio, friends, sorority sisters and business associates have through contributions purchased an iron lung which was presented recently to the Sister Kenny Polio Hospital in Farmington.

Joan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Walls of South Johnson Avenue, Pontiac, was admitted to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in October, 1952, with bulbar polio and transferred to Sister Kenny Hospital in Farmington. Her illness proved fatal after four days and she died on October 22.

She had become a member of the Pontiac Alpha Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority in 1947 and held the treasurer's office one year and was president of the 1951 and 1952 session. A fund was started after her death by her co-workers at the Community National Bank in Pontiac with her sorority acting as sponsors.

At a state council meeting in Lansing the undertaking was met with so much enthusiasm that other state chapters of the sorority voted to donate proceeds from their own projects to assist the Alpha Alpha Chapter to reach its goal.

As a result of their combined efforts an iron lung, complete with respiration dome, alarm, aspirator, mirror, book rest, foot rest attachment and a tracheostomy tube with collar was purchased and presented to the Sister Kenny Hospital here. A plaque was added to the lung with the following inscription: "In Memory of Joan Phyllis Walls Donated to the Sister Kenny Polio Hospital, Oakland County, by Friends and Sisters of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority, 1951."
