EVEN THE BEST FIND CRAFTY DEER HARD TO CORNER

Hunters, if you got your buck this season, you should feel mighty proud.
By the same token, if you missed out, don't feel too bad. Deer are a good deal more crafty than many persons think.
The experiment was held in the square-mile fenced enclosure at the conservation station in the upper peninsula. The enclosure contains a square mile of typical upper peninsula deer country, including acres of pine, mixed woods, swamps, and 32 deer. The area is used for a controlled study of deer food and reproduction problems.
Part of the work this fall called for cropping off one-third of the deer.
Some department workers, all experienced woodsmen, were picked out to conduct the plot-sized "any deer season," and armed with deer permits, they set out into the pen.
They hunted four days before seeing one of the seven antlered bucks in the enclosure. They bagged their first one only one they saw. During the four days, too, several persons "drove" or tried to scare the deer into the paths of the seven hunters.
During the four days, however, the woodsmen bagged eight other deer - does and fawns - making a total of nine from the herd when the experiment was called off at the end of the fourth day.
"These men were all good hunters," said S. C. Whitlock, in charge of game research, "and the deer were inside a fenced area where they couldn't leave the country. It simply shows how difficult the deer can sometimes make this business of deer hunting."

Babson Forecasts Increase In Business Volume In 1955

TURBID GOODS. Even with the expected pickup in demand, I see no sharp drop in industrial prices. Overall supplies are generally ample. Hence, I forecast that industrial prices in 1955 will show little change from recent levels.
17. FOOD PRICES. Food prices may firm later in 1955. The strong move into Government crop loans this year has made free supplies of many agricultural items less burdensome. I forecast that new advertising programs by canners and other great food distributors will help farmers, stock raisers, and fruit growers.
18. CONSUMER INCOME. Consumer income will hold at satisfactory levels. Most goods should be readily going to consuming channels.
19. LIVING COSTS. I forecast that during 1955 living costs will show little overall change from present levels. Of an inflationary trend during the first half, but the late months may again witness a minor softening.
20. RENTS, ETC. I forecast that rents and other housing costs should be steady to moderately higher. There is small chance that food expenses can be greatly reduced. I forecast that money supplies will be ample for all legitimate business needs during 1955. With little likelihood of business getting out of hand on the upside, credit easing is more likely than credit curbing in 1955.
21. INFLATION. Fears, or perhaps hopes, of an inflationary trend should be buried.arring outbreak of war, our productive capacity is sufficiently large to meet all demands for goods. There should be no runaway inflation. It is probable, even if the money managers increase the supply of money or ease credit.
22. INTEREST RATES. Until the Treasury finds a way to curb the budget, hold business at high levels and unemployment at a minimum, I forecast little likelihood of higher interest rates.
23. BOND PRICES. With the possible exception of tax-free bonds, I see no reason for increased bond prices in 1955. I forecast an increase in the issuance of tax-free revenue bonds.
24. STOCK PRICES. After so sharp a rise, the market could have a reaction; but I am forecasting no crash in 1955 such as we had in 1929. In fact, the situation changed for the better October 11, 1954.
25. WAGES. I forecast that the wage trend in organized industry will continue to move higher, at least in the first half of 1955. During the first half year, when business will be improving, the labor chiefs will also be quick to resort to the strike weapon.
26. OTHER LABOR GAINS. I forecast that the labor union movement will be trained on the guaranteed annual wage, shorter work week, and more pensions. With a better congressional control of appointments to the National Labor Relations Board, the decisions of that body will swing more toward labor than toward management.
27. NEW INVENTIONS. These will mostly be a labor-saving type. I forecast a marked increase in automation and cybernetics, and other marvelous changes in production methods.
28. EMPLOYMENT. Unemployment outlook is brighter, since business will be on the upgrade during the first half. I forecast that local and seasonal unemployment will still prove a knotty problem.
29. FAILURES. The salient business characteristics of 1955 will be better competition, more mergers and consolidations, and a more active role for government. While every effort will be made to prevent bankruptcies, Washington will frown on large mergers and consolidations.
30. GENERAL REAL ESTATE SALES. The time is already past when real estate prices should have been falling. Only a few more other catastrophes hold, have prevented this. Therefore, I forecast that a downturn in prices cannot long be postponed.
31. CRIMES. The greatest speculation will take place in the seeking and trading of land with uranium prospects. This is now, centered in Colorado, Utah, and vicinity; but I forecast it will spread in a limited way to other areas, and even to "offshore" property. It could exceed the gold rush of 1849. Any other demand will be for woodlands which can be bought for a few dollars per acre.
32. COMMERCIAL FARMS. These have suffered a decline in price as a result of the slump in agricultural prices. Some of the larger farms will be done politically for the farmers next year. I forecast that the recent decline in commercial farm prices may continue during 1955. Bigger farms should hold up well in price as migration toward the suburbs continues.
33. VACANT AND IN CITY AREAS. With the exception of parking lots, city vacant land should experience a continued slow reduction in price during 1955; but no marked drop, except for parking. I am very bullish on land anywhere suitable for parking.
34. BUSINESS PROPERTY. I forecast little hope for an improvement in such property in the larger cities during 1955. Business property in the suburbs has not been so inflated, and therefore will not be the choice of purchasers, even though older homes give better values.
35. TAXES. The Eisenhower Administration has already realized that expanding business and increased expenditures for plant and equipment are the true sources for rising employment. CHRONIC EAR ACHE REQUIRES SPECIAL ATTENTION, CARE

You can have chronic ear infections and not know it. It is a chronic ear ache that at least one out of 100 men are rejected from army service because of this medical condition. This group is second in size only to those rejected for psychiatric reasons.

46. TRAVEL AND SPORTS. I forecast more money will be spent on travel and sports in 1955. This is becoming an important new industry and should especially benefit Florida, California, Arizona, New Mexico, the Great Lakes Region, New England, and the Northwest.
47. NEW METALS AND ALLOYS. Next to air-conditioning, I expect great growth in the use of new metals and alloys. I forecast the new-metal stocks will be sought in 1955 as were the oils in 1954.
48. ADVERTISING. I forecast business spending in this field will increase further in 1955. The most important factor in individual businesses, but is the best stimulant for national prosperity.
49. POPULATION. I forecast the population will continue to increase during 1955, with a growth percentage of young people between 18 and 22. This means a greater demand for clothing, college education, and especially for new school buildings.
