LOCAL JUDGE TO CRACK DOWN ON DRUNK DRIVERS

Judge John J. Schulte announced the future policy of his court this week on drunk driving cases. "The Municipal Court of Farmington," he said, "has formally adopted the policy of sentencing to jail in every case any motorist found guilty (or who pleads guilty) to a charge of drunk driving in which a driving was injured in which a person was injured."

Commenting on this firm policy aimed at preventing accidents due to drunk driving, Judge Schulte said, "I am sure that the people of the City of Farmington have no sympathy for any motorist found guilty of drunk driving, and so impaired by drinking that he causes an accident while driving drunk. Obviously, the fear of merely paying a cash fine is not substantial enough to discourage persons tempted to run the risk of such a terrible threat to public safety."

"The drunk driving problem is a lot more serious than most people realize," the Judge continued. "Since the records show that in nearly one quarter of the fatal accident cases in Michigan the drivers were reported as 'had been drinking.'"

In conclusion, Judge Schulte said, "Winter driving with longer hours of darkness, bad weather and slippery streets requires the best ability of a sober driver, and no smart person would reduce his driving ability by any process."

It is important to remember that the person who is drunk and creeping along at 10 miles per hour is not nearly as bad a threat as the person who is in the earlier stages of drinking who is lulled into a sense of false security and who becomes a show-off.
