(Continued from Page 2B) subject of "Patriotism" were these three objectives: (1) Value for the American heritage and desire to safeguard it; (2) Understanding of and belief in the ideals upon which America was founded; (3) Appreciation of the American way of life and an attitude of loyalty to America.

Under "Patriotism," space in this column does not permit my giving the long list of details of "How It's Taught... And Why." But under "And Why" was this final reason: "To develop American citizens who have had instilled in them a devotion to our nation... not a blind, emotional feeling, but a deep, enduring faith in our way of life... a faith held fast by courage born of knowledge and love of country."

Under "Moral and Spiritual Values," the objective set forth was to give the youngsters "understandings, attitudes, habits and skills for living in accordance with high moral and spiritual ideals." Among the details of "How It's Taught," was this: "Through reading, discussion and through individual group counseling, young people are assisted... (toward development of) habits of truthfulness and honesty (and to understand and appreciate) the unchanging moral and spiritual values so essential to the American way of life."
