Motor Vehicle Laws Passed by State Legislature

Several new motor vehicle laws were passed by the Michigan Legislature this year. Those marked by an asterisk became effective upon approval by the governor. All others will become effective on October 14.

P. A. 76* Provides for tax-free sale of new motor vehicles which are to be immediately removed from the State of Michigan and not registered in this state.

P. A. 77* Provides special registration (in-transit stickers) for new motor vehicle purchased by non-resident for removal from Michigan.

P. A. 87* Increases gasoline tax 1 1/2 per gallon and vehicle registration fees approximately 10% to provide funds for highway construction.

P. A. 110 Permits Michigan Highway Reciprocity Board to enter agreements for the preparation of certain vehicle registration and fees.

P. A. 159* Gives investigators of the Department of State authority of peace officers in enforcement of financial responsibility provisions of Vehicle Code.

P. A. 174 Provides that on and after October 1, 1955, all commercial vehicles must be equipped with hot air windshield defroster or electrically heated windshield; and on and after January 1, 1956, all new motor vehicles must be equipped with windshield washers.

P. A. 182 Sets up new procedures for administration by department of "ham" radio operator license plate law.

P. A. 208* Permits height of 13' for vehicles hauling hay or straw or outdoor motor and row boats; and permits farm tractors to haul two wagons and/or trailers at speed of not more than 15 MPH, total length to be not more than 55 feet.

P. A. 219 Increases financial responsibility maximum filing requirements to \$10,000/\$20,000 for public liability and \$5,000 for property damage.

P. A. 222 Requires that accidents in which damage in excess of \$100 is done to the property of any one person be reported to the Secretary of State.

P. A. 235 Exempts from Michigan use tax automobiles purchased in another state by Michigan residents in military in another state when sales tax was paid in the state of purchase.

Woodcreek Family Finds European Tour Interesting And Educational

A trip to Europe is something that very few people even dream about, let alone make a reality. The Taylor family of Westport Court have done just that. As one can well imagine, a trip like this is not entered into without proper preparation. Together with the Max Faulkners of Detroit, who accompanied them, the Taylors studied and planned for two years to work out all the details of the tour. Weather conditions in various countries at different times of the year were carefully considered. Hotel accommodations and transportation schedules were checked and reservations were made in advance. Tickets for plays, etc., which they would be attending in various countries also had to be purchased well in advance. Even the light conditions that would facilitate the most advantageous movie had an influence in shaping their plans. All these preliminaries added greatly to the smoothness and enjoyment of their trip.

The party started out on July 20 and flew to the International Airport in New York. There they boarded an air liner for Lisbon, their first stop after refueling in the Azores. In Portugal they visited several small fishing villages and then flew to Madrid. Bull fighting, which is accepted there very much as prize fighting is here, proved to be too much for our travelers. They had to walk out on what the natives probably considered the best part of the show. They got some good movies in Madrid. Eating too much of the luscious native fruits does not always agree with the tourists.

Throughout all Europe, except where mountain spring supply the water, one can never be quite sure of the purity of the drinking water, the Taylors disclosed. It is never served with meals except by special request. Wine is the national common table beverage. Before leaving Spain they visited Toledo, where the famous Toledo Steel rapiers are made.

They then continued on to Nice and Cannes, the French Riviera. At Monte Carlo Dick won 10,000 francs (about thirty dollars).

Rome became their next temporary headquarters. They hired a car and toured the toe of Italy and Sorrento. One of the most beautiful sights of that area, they felt, was the Blue Grotto, a huge cavern which is accessible only at low tide. Even then, one had to lie flat in a small boat to get under the arch. Once inside the cavern, the only source of light came up through the water, a natural source of subterranean lighting that showed the water to be a brilliant clear sapphire blue, with many beautiful fishes and marine life swimming about.

They sailed from Naples to the Isle of Capri, where they attended a brilliant clear sapphire blue, with many beautiful fishes and marine life swimming about.

They had the unexpected pleasure of meeting Grace and Clyde. They swam in her swimming pool, and she very graciously consented to being photographed on movie film.

Again in Rome they attended the huge amphitheater, capacity about 12,000, formerly the ancient Roman baths. They enjoyed the presentation "The Lovers." The crowd couldn't begin to do justice to St. Peter's, with all its splendor and beauty, they exclaimed. They viewed the sunken tomb of Scaevola, surrounded by huge obelisks, and the innumerable treasures and works of art that abound there. They received the Pope's blessing in St. Peter's square. They found Rome was one of the cleanest and most beautiful cities in Europe.

The Apennian Way, our travelers discovered was lined on both sides by tombs of notable people. The ancient city of Pompeii, being dug out from under layers of hardened lava, was very interesting. They returned to Rome and toured the Catacombs, where early Christians sought refuge from persecution.

Florence and Venice, complete with gondolas were the next stops on the tour. For all their picturesque beauty, Grace thought the streets of water were rather

musty and smelly. In Austria, Innsbruck and the entire Tyrol region proved very colorful and picturesque to the travelers. In these rural mountain areas, the frugal, hard-working people lead full, happy lives, living very much the same as their forefathers did hundreds of years ago. Even the short leather breeches with bib and suspenders, and the jaunty feathered caps for men, and full, gathered skirts for the ladies were very much in evidence. The people extended hospitality that was warm and sincere. In Kreuzlingen they looked up a Dr. Stahl, whose children, here in America, are friends of the Taylors.

In Salzburg they attended the famous music festival. Great musicians from all over the world study there. Tickets to the festival had to be procured far in advance of the trip in order to be assured of admission.

Munich and Vienna were next visited. They spent some time on Lake Constance, or the Baden Sea as Europeans call it. In Glacier County they climbed to the top of Young Frau Peak cog railway and the last part on foot. There it has been proven that one's feet can be freezing while his face is getting sun-burned. The top of the mountain, 12,000 feet up, is a small ice-covered plateau that curves down at the edges giving one the feeling that slipping off would be very easy. In Nature's Ice Grotto, man has carved a magnificent ice palace. Chairs, clocks, and everything sculpture out of solid ice. In Zermatt, by cog railway again, they traveled 50 miles to the Matterhorn. Dick got some beautiful colored movies of the water, the Matterhorn and Interlachen with their beautiful lakes formed by glacial waters, were then visited.

The Rhine Valley, which is in the French sector of Switzerland, is a lush fruit belt. In one area the entire countryside was covered with rich vineyards as far as the eye could see. In Koblenz they attended the beautiful annual water festival and the presentation of "Night in Venice." As they traveled down the Rhine River to Cologne, the traffic in the water came loaded. On both sides of the river, the Taylors stated, were railroads, and highways equally heavy with traffic. It is in that area where they saw "Lorelei Rock," where a legendary siren was supposed to lure sailors to their deaths. Also viewed was "The Mouse," a castle built in the middle of the sea where the princes in power used to charge a toll of anyone using the river.

From Cologne they traveled to Düsseldorf and then to Essen, Holland, and Amsterdam. Holland is mainly a rolling meadow with many cows and pigs but few windmills. The source of power there has been electricity for a long time. Through Rotterdam, Belgium and Brussels, the country and the people looked very prosperous and progressive. They saw some very modern and beautiful ranch type homes.
