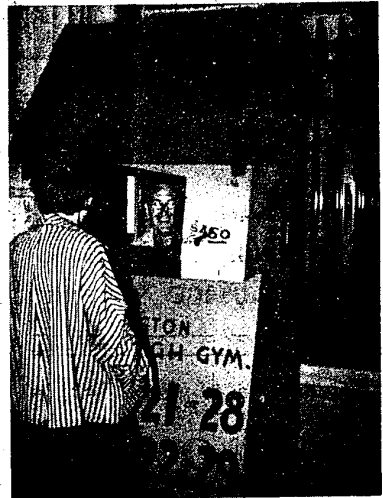

LIMIT FISHING IN GREAT LAKES FOR SPAWNING SEASON

Lake trout fishing will be prohibited in Lake Superior October 5 to November 4 in keeping with a long-standing Conservation Commission policy.

The fishing will also be prohibited in Lake Huron October 1 to 31 and in Lake Michigan October 10 to November 15 as specified by state law, though of course little such fishing is now done in these two lakes.

Whitefish will be protected November 1 to December 1 in Lake Superior, November 1 to 26 in Lake Michigan and December 1 to March 10 in Lake Erie.

No permits will be issued to anyone to fish for spawners within these dates though attempts are scheduled before and after the closed season.

This year, however, there will be no closed season on chubs. Last year, chub fishing was prohibited November 1 to 26 but the law was changed this year to permit fishermen to harvest an expected high population.

Joseph Gaffney, Sr., Joseph M. Gaffney, Sr., owner and founder of the famous Gaffney's Buttermilk stand west of Farmington, died in Miami, Florida, on September 29 following an illness of about four months.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday morning from the William Sullivan and Sons Funeral Home in Royal Oak. Interment was in Oakview Cemetery in Royal Oak.

Gaffney, 72, was born February 24, 1883, in Cass City, Michigan, and founded his famous buttermilk stand west of Farmington in 1928. In 1942 he retired and moved to Florida.

He is survived by his wife, Emma, and sons, James T. of Novi, Robert J. of Brighton, and J. Mathew, Jr. of Arlington, Virginia; and a brother, Charles, of Detroit; and seven grand children.

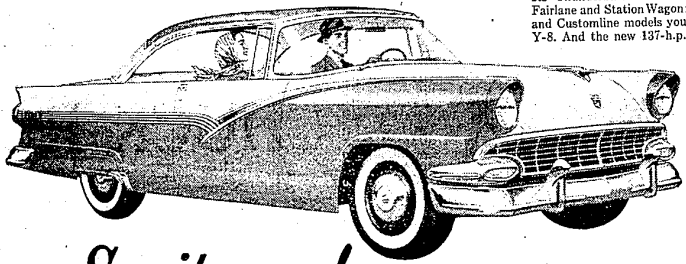

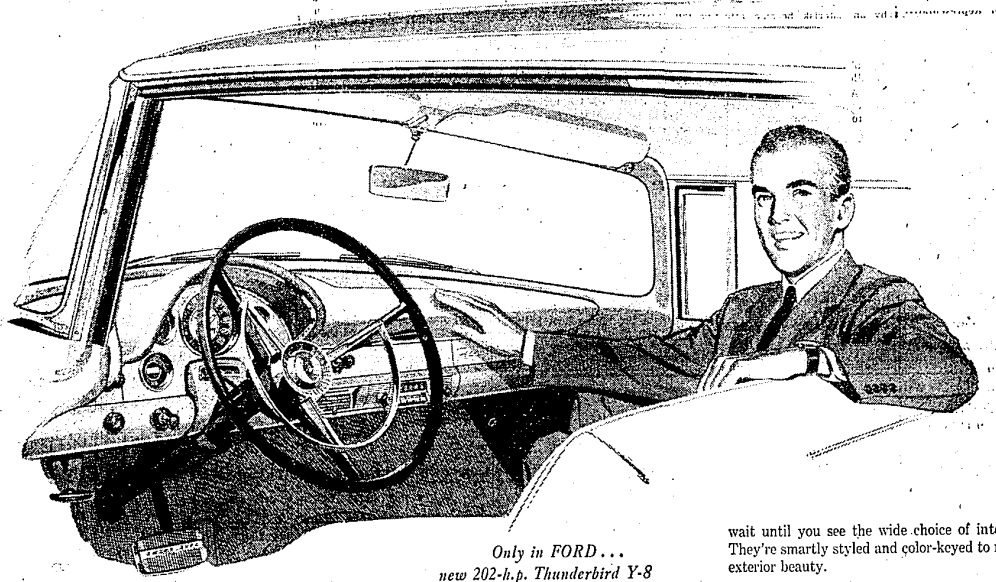
