In the Red League, composed of sophomores and freshmen, Team 3 beat Team 4 by default. Team 4 did not have enough players to finish a full team.

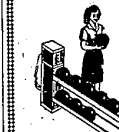
Mr. Thomas Peace, intramural director, stated that, if the problem of team, not being at full strength keeps arising, the league will have to be abolished. J. R.

# Farmington Moves Into Four Way Tie For First Place In Conference

The Falcons, paced by Ron Donahue's 12 points and brilliant first half, headed into a four way tie for first place in the Inter-Lakes League by trouncing the underdog Waterford Skipper 66-12 last Friday.

The Falcons are now tied with Van Dyke, Waldo Lake, and Berkeley for first place.

The weaker Waterford quintet was never a threat to the rampaging Falcon scorers.

The Falcons took an early lead on Donahue's two free shots, then raced ahead of the Skipper to end the first period ten points in front of Waterford, 24-16.

First period scoring was led by Donahue, who had eight. He was followed closely by John Fawcett and Jerry Rice, who both racked up six points. Fawcett made his six by sinking six out of six free shots. Bruce Shugart, Dick Grimshaw, and Bud Jones were the other first period scorers, each having two points on field goals.

With a comfortable first period lead built up, Coach Bob Barich began substituting freely, putting in Donahue, who made four points during the game. Craig Ruckelshaus, who scored two points; Don Robinson, who had seven points for the game; and Chuck Beck, who played only briefly.

In the fourth period Coach Barich dipped further into the ranks of Falcon cagers, sending in five freshmen: Don West, Jack O'Neil, Jan Mathes, Dick Presley, and Doug Byron. These men, aided by Nichols, Jones and Robinson, pushed up Farmington's score to 66 points. West got two, O'Neil one, Presley two, and Byron two.

Jerry Ruckelshaus led the Skipper in scoring, dunking five field goals and four free shots for a 14-point total.

The next game is Friday night with Van Dyke, away. This promise to be a very interesting game if the Falcons can beat Van Dyke they could possibly move into undisputed first place in the league.

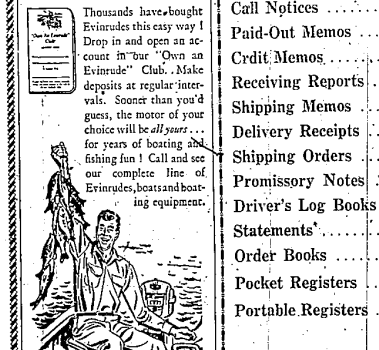
# Donkey Basketball Game Planned At C. H. S. Jan. 29
