More Money Put In Savings Accounts In 1954, States Detroit Bank Head

"One of the interesting things about 1954 is this: Americans put more money into savings accounts last year than in any other year since the beginning of the war," said Walter Gehrke, president of the First Federal Savings of Detroit.

"This high rate of savings is all the more remarkable because of the tremendous production of goods of American industry, and the spirited competition for the public's dollar. This competition is evident every time we open a new savings account, watch TV, listen to the radio, or open our daily mail. From all directions we are besieged with appealing descriptions of brand new streamlined cars, new appliances, and the merchandise of a variety and quality that is the envy of people of all countries."

"We can only conclude that people generally have decided that it pays to save something regularly, not only for a rainy day, but for future enjoyment. The dollars we put away today are, after all, mainly being accumulated for future spending. We are today so we can spend for something worth while later on. The purpose may be spending for a youngster's education. It's estimated that 25% of the people who save are saving for that purpose, and with the cost of higher education today, it's a good idea to get started early!" Others save for future home-ownership, a start in business, and for an endless number of other purposes.

"The fact is that the great majority of people work on salary or at a fixed hourly rate. Most of them get the worth while things of life only through saving for a period of time. Even when the purchase of a home, say, can be financed over a long period, it takes the average family a while to accumulate the down payment, which usually represents a substantial amount."

"The big opportunities to progress, too, usually involve saving on someone's part. Some of the great, international businesses of today grew back to unshakably small beginnings, years ago. Checking your bank, you'll find that some other saved to get the money that gave her boy an engineering or legal education, or some young fellow saved a few hundred or thousand dollars, and used it to advantage when his big chance came."

"We are, of course, happy that so much of the public's savings (last year well over \$3,900,000,000 of it) went into insured savings and loan associations. From reports in a national magazine, this is 44% of the \$8,100,000,000 that went into all types of savings accounts. And last year, the insured associations were the nation's largest source of mortgage loans for home building, buying and alterations."

quote means of sewage disposal. Franklin Knolls Subdivision presently faced with a critical sewage problem, has deemed it necessary to take steps for the establishment of their own sewage disposal plant. Several other areas are running into more and more sewage trouble as new subdivisions and homes spring up.

On the basis of the survey to be conducted, a new authority of a sewage authority is feasible. Further steps will be taken. A request would be made to the City of Detroit to tie into its sewer system. It has already been confirmed that approval for joining into the Detroit system would more than likely be granted. The proposed tie-in would be made at Grand River and Six Mile Road.

A sewer would then be constructed from the Detroit system connection point westward to Farmington with another line running north and south through the sewage authority area. Feeder lines would be extended out from these two main lines to service communities in the authority district.

Another meeting of the sewage authority committee was tentatively set for Tuesday afternoon, January 18, at the Farmington Municipal Building. The group will discuss the project with representatives of the engineering firm of Fate and Hira.
