

What It's Like To Patrol Township

What's it like to be a cop in Farmington Township?

For Pat Stempien, 27, it has been a rewarding 15-year experience, although he does admit to some frustrating moments.

"It is a rewarding effort because you are helping out

but sometimes it is frustrating as hell when you think you're doing a good job and the public doesn't see it that way," says Stempien.

Joining the department as a recruit, Stempien is an ex-cop of the new breed among police officers. His background belies the public image of the roughnecks, quick-on-the-draw cop. A

graduate of Wayne State University, he earned a BS in police administration and intends to continue his education by working for a master's degree.

"Education and experience are a good mix. What it takes the other guy six years to learn, it takes the guy with a degree only two years."

Admitting that the educational theory must be backed by experience, Stempien worked full time while going to school full time, and at the same time took care of his

family of two children.

"I decided to do it the hard way...figuring I could apply what I learned in the classroom to the street situation. It doesn't take too long to catch on, even if sometimes you have to work off the seat of your pants."

Joining 44 other full time township police officers in covering 33 square miles of territory, Stempien takes pride in the way he is able to deal with the community.

Cruising on the typical beat, he enjoys stopping to watch a few minutes of a

Little League game, while always being alert to any situation that might arise.

Courtesy is a byword with Stempien. Whoever he approaches is treated with respect, even if they are suspected of an infraction of the law.

"His hard to tell if the people you stop are telling the truth or not, but it never hurts to be polite."

He believes that many suburbanites have over-reacted to the drug abuse scene.

"Many people have scared themselves for nothing. Ev-

ery time they see a group of kids, they associate them with drugs and 'suspicious' situations. Actually, drug usage is decreasing among young people."

Stempien feels fortunate in not having too many close scrapes with danger, and is able to keep a sense of humor about police work.

With a wry smile, he tells of an incident.

"We got a call that two men were leaving a house with two long guns. On investigating, we saw the men approaching with the rifles

Sealed bids for the purchase of Staman Acres Subdivision Sewer Special Assessment Bonds, to be issued by the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, of the par value of \$275,000 will be received by the undersigned, at the Township Hall, 13500 Evergreen Mile Road, in said Township until eight o'clock P.M., Eastern Daylight Time, on Monday, the 11th day of June, 1973, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated April 1, 1973, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 upwards, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 9% per annum payable on June 1, 1974, and there after semi-annually on the first days of June and December. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted for any one bond shall be at one rate only and shall be evidenced by one coupon only for each coupon period. Bonds maturing in the same year shall bear interest at the same rate and no bond shall bear interest at a rate less than 30% of the rate of interest borne by any other bond. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

The said bonds will mature serially on June 1 in each year as follows:

\$15,000 in the year 1974; and \$50,000 in each of the years 1975 through 1987.

The bonds maturing prior to the year 1983 shall not be subject to redemption. The bonds of said issue maturing in the years 1983 through 1987 shall be subject to redemption, at the option of the Township, in direct numerical order, on any one or more interest payment dates on and after June 1, 1982, at the par value thereof and accrued interest. Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of bonds called for redemption at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of the sale of municipal bonds. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem the same.

Each principal and interest will be payable at such bank or trust company, qualified to serve as paying agent under the Statute of the State of Michigan or the United States of America, as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds, subject to redemption.

The said bonds are to be issued in satisfaction of the collection of the equal amount of special assessments against lands in a certain special assessment district to defray the cost of constructing sewers in said Township, and in addition, will pledge the full faith and credit of the Township for the payment of the principal and interest thereon. The Township's taxing power to make such payment without limitation as to rate or amount.

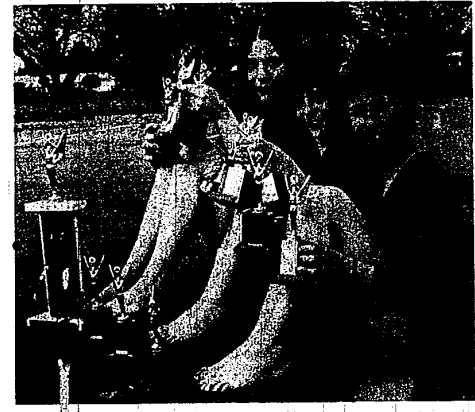
For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from July 1, 1973 to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the Township. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$5,000 drawn on an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Township Treasurer must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the Township. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers, including a non-diligence certificate, dated as the date of delivery of the bonds. Said bonds will be delivered within forty-five (45) days from the date of sale and if said bonds are not delivered by twelve o'clock noon, Eastern Daylight Time, on the fortieth day from the date of sale, the successful bidder may withdraw his proposal by serving notice of cancellation in writing on the undersigned in which event the good faith check shall be promptly returned. Bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan, or such other place as may be agreed upon between the Township and the purchaser.

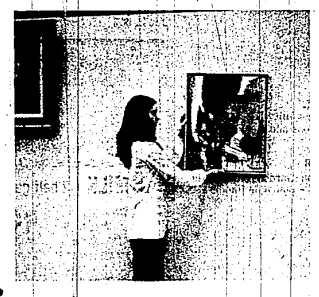
