We hope so, for your sake and for the sake of your community. Many words have been expended regarding the privilegea and responsibilities of voting. It is doubtful if we could add anything sensational to their meaning and purpose. We all recognize the importance of action at the polling booth. We all know that it is an individual responsibility that can not be ignored. But too often we look upon voting as a job for the other fellow. We're just too busy.

What happens when we stay away from the voting place on election day? Someone else elects our public officials whether we, as an individual, happen to agree or not. When we fail to vote on election day we become a contributor to the dangerous processes of minority rule and at the same time forsake, for the moment at least, our rights and privileges as citizens. It is well to remember that many times officials are elected to public office by a mere handful of votes. It is also important to keep in mind that many elections attract only 20% or 30% of the eligible voters. This is what happens when you stay away from the voting places on election day! Continuation of this practice can result in an eventual breakdown of the foundation of our democracy. It is that important and that seriques.
