All Farmington P. T. A. organizations will celebrate Founders' Day together at a Joint Founders' Day Dinner to be held Monday, February 7, at 6:30 p.m. in the gymnasium at 33000 Thomas Street.

Arrangements for the dinner are being made by the Joint Founders' Day committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Farrel Weber. Through the efforts of Mrs. William Fulton, nationally known speaker and author Dr. Frank D. Slutz will be the speaker for the evening.

Dr. Slutz has spent his life in the field of education. He holds degrees from Mount Union College of Alliance, Ohio; Harvard University; and the University of Denver. He has served as a teacher, principal, superintendent, director and educational advisor since 1932. He has been engaged almost entirely in educational guidance and counseling in high schools and colleges. He is co-author of "Am I Getting an Education" published in 1929, and author of the following books: "Thinking Things Through," "Methodist Men at Work," "Techniques of Management," and "Human Factors in Business and Industry."

The title of Dr. Slutz's address for the Founders' Day Dinner will be "Questions Youths Are Asking."

Dinner will be pot-luck buffet style. Parents from Bond School will provide potato dishes; those from Ten Mile School, salad dishes; those from Middlebelt School, desserts; and the high school parents will provide hot vegetables. The Junior High mothers will work in committees on tables, decorations and serving.

A summer wedding is planned by the couple.

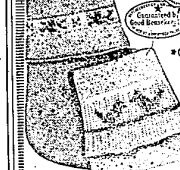

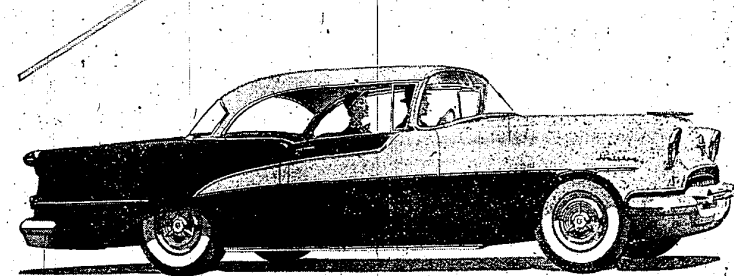
