at a later date it could be tied into the city system if desired.

During the discussion Monday several minor changes in the proposed water district were suggested. A vote was requested by the Board to prepare several copies of the specifications and statistics for the proposed system so that they could be distributed to the Water Committee and the Board. The details of the proposal will be presented by the Committee to interested citizens at a public meeting to be held in the near future. A similar meeting was held last Friday evening in the high school gymnasium at which time approximately 150 persons attended.

The engineer was also asked to contact bonding authorities regarding the financial aspects of the proposed project. It was indicated at the meeting that the financing is a vital phase of the project which must be worked out early to insure continuing development of the program.
