Anticipate Need For 1,000,000 Acres Of Playgrounds In Southern Michigan

A 1,000,000-acre playground is needed in southern Michigan. Such a playground, experts say, would be sufficient to serve both present and projected needs of the people of the state.

Right now, 200,000 acres of this playground are open for use at any time of the year. The total is scattered in state parks, recreation areas, the Huron-Clinch Metropolitan Authority, hunting areas and other places where residents can go and picnic, play, or just goof off.

This 300,000 acres, however, represents the total in public ownership. It means that 700,000 acres still need to be purchased. This need is not imaginary, recreational leaders point out. In 1930, Michigan housed 2,000,000 people. In 1950, the total was 3,000,000. By 1980, an estimated 5,000,000 will live in Michigan.

Arthur C. Elmer, chief of the conservation department's parks division, says that more than 15,000,000 persons entered state parks in 1954. He adds that the trend of state park use in the last 15 years has been a steady increase, with new attendance records set each year. Many parks already strain at the seams on any given summer week end, and with industries and cities constantly expanding, the need for getting-away-from-it-all apparently increases yearly.

Conduct Survey Among Deer Hunters In State

About 1200 Michigan deer hunters are being asked to give their observations and opinions about recent deer hunting activity in the state.

Questionnaire postcards were mailed to the 1200 late last week, asking how many deer they saw during the 1954 seasons, whether they prefer Saturday, Sunday or weekdays opening.
