system rather than proceed with the construction of subdivision treatment plants. The Drain Commissioners added that speculators would probably be willing to contribute provided they had assurances that the system would be constructed within a specific length of time.

Stevens stated that an authority cannot be set up until the preliminary engineering work has been completed. As soon as the boundaries have been outlined, the respective municipalities can petition the Oakland County Board of Supervisors for the establishment of a sewer district and an authority to administer the proposed system.

Boys studying and working with youngsters in the classrooms. Miss Bellardi participated with students from Bond School on a field trip to Cranbrook and with students of the American Art and Girls on a field trip to Greenfield Village.

In addition to classroom work the young German exchange teacher attends P. T. A. meetings, teachers' meetings, a music workshop for teachers, a county curriculum meeting, an administrative meeting of the American Association of University Women and took part in local church services.

Joining Farmington children at the Masson Temple to hear a Youth Symphony Concert, Miss Bellardi stated that she was very much impressed with the way in which the music was presented and explained to the youngsters. "Too bad the seats weren't all filled. The concert was so wonderful," the German teacher commented.

In a personal interview, Miss Bellardi stated that she was highly interested by the way in which American youngsters take duties upon themselves, express themselves freely and practice self-discipline. She also commented on the fine, mature actions of children in the younger grades and how well they seemed to work together in an atmosphere of friendship.

"I am fascinated by your spacious, single family homes and fine lawns," she stated. American food was a treat to the German teacher, but she missed the atmosphere of German restaurants.

"Your movies are fine," stated Miss Bellardi, "but I don't care too much for your westerns or double features. Radio programs are very interesting here too, but good programs are interrupted too frequently with advertisements," she said.
