To The Parents of 12 to 15 Year Old Boys

I have been making over the predicament of the Babe Ruth Baseball League in Farmington this past winter and now I'm going to explode!

In a city the size of Farmington it seems a downright shame to me the way people are neglecting to support the baseball league of young men 12 to 15 years of age which we have here. It is these boys who need supervised recreation and the attention and interest of their parents most.

It is true that boys of Little League age need recreation too, but my opinion, not as much as do the boys in the older age group. They don't seem to get in as much trouble and still have cowboy, kite flying and Cub and Boy Scout-ing to hold their interest.

Boys in the 12 to 15 year age group feel they need something a little more "grown up," however, and playing ball (whether it be baseball, football or basketball) seems to meet that requirement.

It is discouraging to see so few people taking interest in the boys of Babe Ruth League age. Pres-ently only 50 boys can participate in the program during the summer due to lack of funds, super-vision, and good playing fields.

In the past two years only about 25 quarter of the men who helped in the league had boys in the 12 to 15 year age group, while the remaining number, either had very small boys or no boys at all. You could count on your fingers the fathers and mothers of boys playing last year who at-tended games. Only a handful of fathers were actively interested in the program at all.

Anyone who witnessed a game last year would agree that boys who played were intent and played good ball. Personally, I en-joyed getting acquainted with them and learning what excep-tionally bright and well-mannered young lads they were.

I'll admit the league does still need organization and planning as to such things as a playing site and an operation program. But that is what the baseball meet-ings are for and yet attendance is very poor. Let's get behind this Babe Ruth League a little more eagerly and by so doing help iron out the wrinkles and make it a success.

Every bit of cooperation and interest possible is needed. The fate of the league lies in the hands of the few already participating and the parents of the young men in the 12 to 15 year age group. What will the answer be?
