A Lot Of Thought . .

is being given by city officials to the possible integration of the fire and police department into one full-time public safety agency. The purpose of the proposed integration would be to provide maximum service at a minimum cost to the taxpayers.

Under the program the public safety department would be enlarged sufficiently to allow for full-time police and fire protection. Because the members of the department would serve in a dual capacity, a smaller number of employees would be required than under the separate police and fire system. At the same time, a full-time schedule could be established for both services.

Although this type of organization is far from perfect, we believe it deserves serious consideration as an interim measure to meet the needs of a growing community. The program would necessitate extensive training of personnel in both police and fire work. It would require a slightly larger force on duty at all times, and it would result in some administrative and operational functions. operational functions.

However, it would provide full-time police and fire protection at a minimum of cost. It would also increase the available force of trained personnel to combat either a police or fire emergency. These are both important considerations in a city which is growing as rapidly as Farmington, and yet which is not sufficiently large to maintain two full-time departments.

A number of cities in the metropolitan area, similar in size to Farmington, have initiated this integrated program with considerable success. It is far from perfect, but we believe it has merit as a progressive step in the right direction.
