Over 500 Parents, Teachers At PTA Founders' Day Dinner At High School

Upwards of 500 parents and teachers were in attendance at the All-Farmington P. T. A. Founders' Day Dinner, held at the Farmington High School gym on Monday, February 7.

Vegetables and scalloped potatoes, salads and pies were provided for the mothers for the dinner. Roast beef, provided at cost by Conroy's Market and cooked by the Farmington Bakery, were thoroughly enjoyed by all. Coffee was donated by the Nestle Company and served freely by the Girl Scouts of Tween-Hi Troop 177.

Following the dinner, Ivan Clarke, speaking in behalf of all the P. T. A. groups, introduced the presidents of the Board, Ten Mile and Middlebelt P.T.A.'s, members of the administrative staffs of the schools, and members of the Board of Education. He commended Mrs. Farrel Weber, Founders' Day chairman, and all the members of the Founders' Day committee, room mothers, and all those whose efforts contributed to the success of the first joint P. T. A. Founders' Day Dinner. "A lot of work goes into making this kind of a dinner," he stated, "thanks a million to all of you."

Food for thought was provided by Dr. Frank D. Slutz in his talk built around the topic "Questions Youth Are Asking." The most often asked questions, arranged in order of frequency, are as follows, according to Dr. Slutz: (1) What about boy and girl relations? (2) How do I get along with parents? (3) What about religion? (4) Is an education worth while? (5) How do I go about being liked? Dr. Slutz discussed each of these questions with wit and humor.

He pointed out that although in most instances boy and girl relations take a normal wholesome form, he is apprehensive of the trend toward too much sophistication among the very young folks. "If it continues and grows," said Dr. Slutz, "we will tend to exclaim in frustration. The social life of the young folks must be slowed up a bit."

Better parent-child relations result when, between the ages of one and twelve, a thorough indoctrination of honesty, obedience, cooperation and consideration for others is effected, Dr. Slutz said.

Regarding religion, Dr. Slutz believes that the inadequacy of religious belief is the main reason for mental breakdowns today. He indicated the seriousness of this situation.
