Makes Highest Score In Homemaking Contest; Entered In State Judging

The Betty Crocker Homemaking of Tomorrow in our school is Karen Russell. She received the highest score in a written examination which tested the homemaking knowledge and attitudes of the senior girls in the Senior Homemaking class. She will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaking of Tomorrow. She will receive a golden award pin and cook books for herself and the school.

The national winner in this search conducted among 157,000 young women in 5,000 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 12 at an American table fete in Philadelphia.

General Mills is the sponsor of the program designed to assist schools in building in young women a deeper understanding of the American home and the personal qualities necessary to successful homemaking. A scholarship of \$1,500 will be awarded each state winner and she will receive a trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, and Philadelphia. Her school will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the young woman named "Homemaker of Tomorrow" will be increased to \$3,000.

The 10-minute written examination designed and judged by the Science Research Association of Chicago, which was given to all participants in this national national search, consisted of multiple choice and subjective questions which tested the student's attitude and knowledge in the major areas of homemaking.

Each girl who took the test received a 24-page homemaking guide which will assist her in pursuing the career of homemaking.

Jr. Homemakers Complete Unit

The Junior Homemaking class of Clarenceville has recently completed a unit of study of Social Acceptance under the guidance of teacher, Mrs. JoAnn Doty.

The first course of study in the unit was "Personality and Self." This concerned analysis of individual personalities and ways and means of bettering personality.

The second course of study was "Dating," a vital part and of interest to any high school girl. They studied what is proper on a date, what is the obligation of a gal on a date, places to go and proper dress.

Third course of study was "Parties." The study was of types of parties, dress, refreshments. The girls brought this unit to a climax by having a Valentine tea for the teachers on Wednesday, February 16. The menu consisted of tuna salad sandwiches, potato salad, ice cream and gingerbread and coffee. This tea completed the unit of Social Acceptance.
