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FALCON FROSH WIN ONLY GAME, DOWN SOUTHFIELD

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Trees For Reforestation Still Available In State

About 10,000,000 young trees are still available from the reforestation department's three state nurseries.

The department started its spring sale about three weeks ago. About 15,000,000 young trees, three million were sold in the first six days of the sale.

Free lists and order blanks may be obtained from the department's nursery division at Lapeer, Michigan; not for ornamental landscaping.

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Sluggish First Half Costs Falcons Win; Gives Southfield League Title

WASHINGTON SENDS STEELHEAD TROUT EGGS TO MICHIGAN

Michigan received 50,000 steelhead trout eggs from the state of Washington this week.

In exchange, conservation department fisheries workers here sent about 50,000 rainbow eggs to the West Coast state to augment its supply. The exchange was made at the request of Michigan.

The steelhead eggs will be hatched at Harrietta hatchery.

Experimental plantings will be made in various streams of the state to see if the fish can adapt to Michigan waters. Also, certain planting methods that have worked well in Washington will be tested here.

The steelhead is only slightly different from the Michigan rainbow. The Sport Fishing Institute Bulletin describes the steelhead as a "race of rainbow which spends part of its immature life in fresh water, later migrating to salt water. The urge to leave its home streams comes when the fish is about six inches long. After one to three years in salt water, it returns to the home stream weighing 3 1/2 to 20 pounds, with eight pounds the average."
