PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO STATE CONSTITUTION

Proposal No. 1
An Amendment to Section 23 of Article VII of the State Constitution providing that the election of non-partisan primary elections and elections for judicial offices shall be prescribed by law.

Proposal No. 2
An Amendment to Section 17 of Article VII of the State Constitution relative to the qualifications of supreme court and circuit court judges.

Proposal No. 3
An Amendment to Article X of the State Constitution by adding a new Section 27 authorizing the borrowing of not to exceed \$100,000,000 for loans to school districts.

Proposal No. 4
An Amendment to Article III of the State Constitution by adding a Section 9 and an amendment to Section 20 of Article VI of the State Constitution providing that a state board of canvassers shall be established by law.

Also Any Additional Amendments or Referendums that may be submitted.
